RECEIVER ASKED

HAMPERED BY LACK OF CAPITAL.

Bicycle Trust Seeks Reorganization to Put Its Affairs m Better Shape.

NEW YORK, Sept. 3 .- President R. L. Coleman, of the American Bicycle Company, has issued a statement in regard to the affairs of the company, and plans under consideration for the re-organization of the combination. It BAYS:

Interest on company debenture bonds, September 1 will not be paid at this time

"Proceedings have been instituted looking to the appointment of a temporary receiver of receivers in the interest of bond and stock holders and application of reorganization will be submitted at an early date for their approval.

"The moving reason for this course is that the company is and has been since its organization hampered by lack of working capital and it is confidently expected that the proposed reorganization will furnish the necessary funds for the proper conduct of its business. The company is perfectly solvent and undoubtedly has an assured future. The American Bicycle Company is now a holding company of the stocks of the American Cycle Manufacturing Company, International Motor Car Company, Federal Manufacturing Company and National Battery Company and others. None of these four subsidized companies will be affected by the fact that the parent company has been placed in the hands of a receiver. All are in good condition and what assistance they need will be rendered by the directors of the American Bicycle Company or the bondholders in interest.

"There is no occasion for alarm on account of the above named constituent companies. It should be stated that those most largely interested in the company's securities are working in entire accord and harmony upon the lines indicated.

"The American Bicycle Company was incorporated in New Jersey in May, 1899. It was organized to acquire and operate the works of 44 of the principal manufacturers of bicycles and bleycle parts in the United States. These concerns represented some 55 separate plants which, it was claimed at the time, turned out about 60 per cent of all the bleveles manufactured in the country. The amount of common stock authorized is \$20,000,000, of which \$17,701,500 is outstanding. The preferred stock is \$10,000,000, of which \$9,294,900 is outstanding. The stock holders voted on October 31, 1901, to reduce the authorized stock from \$30,-000,000 to the amounts shown above. The five per cent debentures amount to \$9,500,000."

APPOINTS RECEIVER.

TRENTON, N. J., Sept. 3 .- Judge Kirkpatrick has appointed Colonel Albert A. Pope, R. Lindsay Coleman and John A. Miller receivers for the American Bicycle Company. The company has defaulted in payment of the interest on outstanding bonds amounting to \$225,000.


