GOVERNOR'S SON SIGNS PARDON. Felt Sure His Father Would Have Done Such Had He Been Awake. NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—News papers of this city are commenting on a curious affair which has just taken place, carries the Buenos Ayres correspondent of the Herald. A murderer named Juan Rodriguez was sentenced to death by the tribunal at Mendoza. The governor of the place would not pardon the condemned man, and the execution would have taken place on Thursday except for a dispatch which apparently came at the last moment from President Roca, recommending that a pardon be granted. When the president learned of the pardon he denied having sent such a dispatch. Upon investigation it developed that the message was sent by Dr. Julio Roca, the president's son and private secretary, who signed his father's name to the message. He said he did so in accordance with the request of the Chilean minister, Senor Concha Subercaseaux. Dr. Roca explained that it was too late at night to awaken the president. He therefore sent the dispatch without his father's knowledge, because he was sure the president would not refuse the intercession.

NEW SCHEDULE COSTS MILLIONS Train to Make Distance Between New York and Philadelphia in 75 Minutes. NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—Plans are being formulated by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company for the inauguration of a train service between Broad street station, Philadelphia, and Thirty-fourth street, New York, in 75 minutes, according to the World. These fast trains will be put on when the North river tunnel shall have been completed. It is believed the deadlock now delaying commencement of work on the tunnel will soon be broken. Already a majority of the aldermen on the conference committee are said to be in favor of a report granting the franchise. President A. J. Cassatt now has before him a plan of arbitration of possible labor disputes, which, it is believed, will be satisfactory to all factions. To accomplish the new scheme the company is spending millions. It is straightening long turns in the road, notably about Newark, and planning in every way to reduce the time between the two cities. Plans which the road had under consideration for steel viaducts have been cancelled and stone arch work has been substituted.

SWINDLES BY GETTING INJURED. Were to Fall Off Cars Going at 30 Miles an Hour to Receive Damages. NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—William J. Doran, said to be a member of a gang recently engaged in swindling trolley companies in Philadelphia by falling off cars and extorting damages for pretended injuries, has been arrested here on the complaint of an inspector of the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company. Doran, who is said to be an accomplished acrobat and contortionist, is reported to have repeatedly permitted himself to be struck by cars going at 30 miles an hour without sustaining any injury.

MICHAEL CRIPPLES HURET. French Champion's Ankle Is Terribly Torn by Former's Bicycle Pedal. NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—Michael, the bicyclist, while training, came into a terrific collision, possibly permanently disabling Huret, the French champion, says a Paris dispatch to the World. Huret had his ankle torn and badly splintered by Michael's pedal. Michael visited Huret in the hospital, where the surgeons declared the Frenchman will never be able to ride again.

WILL ENFORCE TRAFFIC LAWS. President Roosevelt's Accident Aroused London Police Authorities. NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—President Roosevelt's accident has strengthened the outcry in this country against the present inadequate regulations for the control of motor traffic, says a London dispatch to the Tribune. The efforts of the police have been so burlesqued in the comic press that they have ceased to be taken seriously.

ARTIST WHISTLER LEAVES FOR EUROPE. NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—James McNeill Whistler, the artist, who was reported to be near death, is quite restored to health and will leave at once for London, says a dispatch to the New York American from The Hague.

AMBASSADOR WHITE RETIRES. Will Edit Book on Developments of Germany During Last Decade. NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—Ambassador White, who will soon retire from his post at Berlin, is, according to a Herald dispatch from Berlin, now at work on a book of reminiscences describing his experiences as minister at Berlin in 1879-81; as minister at St. Petersburg in 1882-94, and as ambassador to Germany since 1897. He is also at work on a volume describing the development of Germany in the last decade.

MAN WHO CONFESSES MURDER RELEASED. NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—Charles R. Toll, who was arrested at Colchester recently upon confessing the murder of a man in Kansas City a year ago last February, has been released, says a Herald dispatch from London. He was not wanted by the Missouri authorities.

SECRETLY DISCUSSING LOAN. HAVANA, Sept. 6.—The house of representatives is daily holding sessions to discuss the question of the \$5,000,000 loan and the matter of providing means to meet it. The idea of establishing a lottery to this end has many supporters, while other members of the house advocate an internal revenue tax.

SANTE FE SHOP MEN RECEIVE AN INCREASE. SAN BERNARDINO, CAL., Sept. 6.—Division Master Mechanic Park of the Santa Fe shops here, has officially announced that hereafter the machinists on this division will receive \$3.50 instead of \$3.25 a day heretofore.
