COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT.

In the county commissioners court yesterday the bonds of R. E. Birchard as Justice of the peace of Mishawaka precinct, and C. C. Uttinger as constable of Astoria precinct were approved. Applications were received for the position of keeper of the Youngs bay draw bridge from W. L. White, Nat Jones and H. A. Hansen. Mr. Jones was appointed at a salary of \$30 per month.

The regular monthly report of John Frye, the road master, was read and filed. Orders were made for lumber to keep the Youngs bay bridge in repair and also for use in road district No. 5. Eighth street between Commercial and Duane was ordered repaved, the sidewalks to be replanked and the street bedded with crushed rock.

The resignation of A. Sigurdson, as supervisor of road district No. 1, was accepted and R. J. Abbott was appointed to the position. There were others who spoke for the appointment but Mr. Abbott's was the only application filed in writing.

A communication was read from W. J. Ingalls, keeper of the Lewis and Clark bridge. The communication dwelt on needed repairs, and it was referred to the road master.

A communication from the Oregon Children's Home asking that the county donate \$10 per month towards the support of the institution was read and the request not granted, there being no special fund for such a purpose and the court not deeming it advisable to appropriate from the general fund. The court adjourned until 9 a. m. today.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.

Foot of Seventh Street a Blackened Ruin.

Over \$70,000 worth of property was destroyed by fire early yesterday morning. The night engineer for the Lindenberger cold storage plant discovered fire in H. B. Parker's barn. He informed Chief Hallock and the officer turned in the alarm and brought the department to the scene at once.

The fire had made considerable headway by this time, and it was impossible to save all the property endangered but the good work of the men with the hose was instrumental largely in saving that end of the city. As it is the losses run up in the thousands. A heavy loser is S. Elmore, whose warehouse and contents, which were totally destroyed, will figure up to about \$2,000. The next on the list is H. B. Parker, who lost his barn worth in the neighborhood of \$1,500. Three horses in the barn were literally roasted alive, though heroic efforts were made to save them. A stubborn fear had seized the brutes and they refused to budge. One of the animals belonged to Patrick Shea who also lost his mail cart. The other two horses belonged to Captain Parker and Hiram Parker, the first being Bob, the well-known bus horse, and the other a beautiful little black, Copeland's warehouse and contents were total losses and will aggregate \$3,000. The damage done to the sailor home owned by Kenney and Lynch, will equal \$500. The other losses were comparatively light, being N. Schlusel, \$100, on Astor street houses; Warren & Lindenberger \$25 and A. C. tracks and cars, \$100.

The principal property destroyed faced north from the south side of the track, that on the north side being only slightly scorched. The sailor board house, jammed as it was right into the totally burned buildings, could hardly be expected to escape some damage and it is really marvelous that it was not entirely destroyed.

The firemen are to be commended for their good work and had it not been for some of the poor apparatus they had to put up with they would doubtless have prevented the conflagration from spreading as it did. The origin of the fire is unknown, but is thought to have been caused by some hobo rummaging about and too careless of other people's property to be allowed to run at large.
