MARINE NOTES.

The O. R. & N. steamer Columbia has arrived from San Francisco.

The three masted schooner Fannie Adell is in from San Francisco to load lumber.

The four masted schooner Fearless left up for Portland Sunday to load lumber.

The lighthouse tender Mazanita will leave up for Portland this morning to take on supplies.

The barkentine Madagascar is in port from Algon bay. The vessel is in ballast under Captain Smith.

The three masted schooner J. M. Wetherax arrived in port Sunday from San Francisco. The vessel will load lumber at Portland.

The German ship Adolph, from San Francisco, Captain Schipmann, arrived in yesterday. The vessel is chartered to load grain at Portland.

The mankett of the British ship Cyromone was filed yesterday in the customs house. The vessel is loaded with 9,814 bushels of wheat valued at \$65,842.

The British steamship Indrashama, Captain Craven, arrived Sunday from Hong Kong via Yokohama. The vessel brought with her matting, rice, tea and curios from the Orient.

The T. J. Potter became so badly damaged while trying to effect a land-

ing at the Alsworth dock in Portland that it has been found necessary to take her off the run pending repairs. The Harvest Queen is running in her stead.

The large English freighter Poplar Branch arrived from San Francisco Sunday and yesterday started up for Portland. The vessel is under Captain Andrew Anderson, who was master of the Olive Branch when that vessel went through the Madison street bridge at Portland.

The American steam schooner Meteor arrived from Portland yesterday and later put to sea. The vessel is bound for Tonolobampo, Mexico, and carries a cargo consisting of 36,172 feet of rough pine, 7,625 feet of surface pine, 899,351 feet of piles, with a total valuation of \$15,469.22.

The steam schooner Grace Dollar put into port yesterday morning in distress. The vessel was bound for San Francisco from Grays harbor with lumber. A defect was discovered in her crank shaft and rather than run any risk of a serious mishap at sea the vessel was put into this port to undergo repairs. Up to a late hour last night she had not started out, but doubtless will this morning.

The Lime Branch has finished taking on its cargo and today will leave the wharf, where it has been lying since coming down from Portland and if the weather and tides are propitious will leave out about noon today. There were 42,356 bushels of wheat valued at \$27,531.40, placed on board the vessel while in this port. The balance of her cargo, 215,962, valued at \$130,449.20, was taken on at Portland. The Lime Branch is bound for Las Palmas, Canaries.
