made an emphatic rejoinder. He closed with the assertion that Frederick Humbert had been a boulangist deputy. Deputy Coustant, socialist, exclaimed that Minister Vallès' statement was a lie. M. Syveton, a nationalist member, addressed the ministers with angry imprecations.

Two angry elements surged back and forth, exchanging blows with clenched fists for several minutes. The president of the chamber called on M. Syveton and M. Coustant to apologize for their conduct. They refused and both were expelled and escorted out by the military.

M. Syveton said Vallès was the aggressor in that he had sent his seconds to the minister. The seconds of M. Syveton and Vallès will make a final arrangement for a meeting of their principals Monday.

TO SERVE FIFTEEN YEARS

Paul Underwood Sentenced for the Murder of Baby.

SEATTLE, Dec. 6.—This afternoon Judge Griffin denied the motion for a new trial in the case of Paul Underwood, who was convicted of the murder of his infant child and sentenced the prisoner to 15 years in the penitentiary.

The attorneys for the defense gave notice of an appeal to the supreme court.
