Ships Sail Even Race.

The two German ships Chile and Nereus, which passed out of the Columbia November 5, sailed a very even race more than half way around the world, says the Oregonian. The Chile, which cleared for Antwerp direct, passed the Isle of Wight last Thursday, and a day later the Nereus arrived at Queenstown. Neither of the vessels made very fast passages, the Nereus being out 135 days; but the fact that they were both so close together and both good sailers would indicate that the slowness was due to the lack of favorable winds than to the lack of skill on the part of the men who were navigat ing the ships. Fast passages have been very rare with the grain fleet of the present season. Up to date not a single vessel from Portland has made the run to Queenstown in 110 days or better, although there were several pas sages of that kind last year. The Peter Rickmers, in 113 days, with the clipper Semantha and the French bark Combronne tied for second place in 116 days The Semantha's last outward trip previous to this was made in 101 days.


