FRACTURED

PELL EIGHTEEN FEET FROM THE STREET TO ROCKS BELOW -DELICATE SURGI-

CAL OPERATION

his earthly career yesterday by falling from the roadway on Eighteenth street to the rocks on the beach below, a distance of 18 feet.

When reached by neighbors who saw him fall over the railing he was lying motionless, his head covered with blood from ghastly wounds. Friends soo brought water and washed the blood away and carried him to his home nearby. Doctor Cordiner was sent for who had the injured man removed at once to St. Mary's hosptal.

His wounds consist of two severe skull fractures, one on the top of his head and one behind the right ear. In the first named it was found necessary a quarter of a dollar in order to remove the splintered inner plate of the skull which caused a severe depression of the brain. On this being done the brain assumed its normal shape and the good effect on the patient was at once apparent.

Mr. Larson regained consciousness last evening and was able to speak, though very weak. Doctor Cordiner thinks he will survive his injuries.

Mr. Larson is 49 years of age and a native of Sweden. He has been in Astoria about 20 years, and lives on Eighteenth street and Grand avenue. The place whate he fell is on the west side of Eighteenth street about 100 feet south of Exchange. Although the top piece of the railing is missing at this point there is sufficient railing to prevent any one from falling over if he has control of himself.

HIGH PRICE OF LOGS CAUSES OP-ERATIONS AT KNAPPTON TO CEASE TEMPORARILY.

The Columbia mill, situated at Knaption at Knappton, will continue in op month for an indefinite period. The reason for the suspension of milling operations is the high price demanded for logs. The Simpson Lumber company has mills at different points on the coast and they all, with the one exception at Knappton, will continue in operation and as soon as the company obtains a reasonable reduction in the price of material, business it is thought

will look up across the way. The price received for logs in that section is \$19 a thousand, and the fargest camp on either Grays or Deep river puts 200,000 feet in the water daily. An uninitiated person might jump at the conclusion that the operator of that camp, providing he sold all his logs at that price, would become a millionaire in a comparatively short space of time, but it is a fact that loggers, while some of them become reasonably well fixed in the course of time, do not develop into millionaires by continuing merely in the logging business. Th expense of running a logging camp is enormous when taking into consideration lesides the pay roll and stumpage, the wear and tear, the occasional slump in the market and loss incident to bad weather.
