Will Take Charge on April 1.

George Uhler, the newly appointed su pervising inspector-general of steam vessels, will take charge of his office April 1. One of Mr. Uhler's plans is 1 3 8 in dia. to get the right kind of material to fill vacancies in the service. Appontments have heretofore been made from an eligible list procured by the civil service commission as the result of a system of examinations that was satisfactory to Mr. Dumont; but that does not come

Civil Service Revised.

Under the revision of the civil service rules, to take effect April 1, announced Wednesday, the classified service is extended to all positions which are subject to-cuassication under the civil service act. The classified service hereafter will embrace all places which are not mere laborers or workmen, or are not subject to confirmation by the senate. The number of places excepted from examination has been reduced, omitting a large number of private secretaries and confidential clerks, although two private secretaries are allowed to all heads of departments. Shipping commissoners, various superintendents, engineers , examiners and miscellaneous positions also have been made subject to examination. Temporary appointments will be restricted both in number and duration

OPIUM EATER

Coroner's Inquest Showed That He Had Been Intoxicated.

Frank Burns, the young man who was found in an unconscious state. Wednesday night from the effects of eating oplum, died yesterday morning at 5 o'clock in St. Mary's hospital with out having regained his senses. The body was taken to Pohl's undertaking rooms and last evening an inquest was held to determine the cause of death, The coroner's jury consisted of J. N.

Laws (foreman), Otto Peterson, C. V. Brown, Phil Hadden, Alex Gilbert and F. P. Moody.

Nothing developed by investigation to show why deceased ate the oplum, other than that he was intoxicated at the time. The evidence, brought forward, did not show that he had been drinking heavily on the night when his fatal condition was discovered, but it was very evident that he had been in a semi-intoxicated condition for some days. The vardict, therefore, was that deceased came to his death by an overdose of onlym, furnished by parties unknown, and that the opium was taken while deceased was in an intoxicated condition.

Little, practically nothing, is known of Burns here. He was without means and at the time of his death had only 30 cents upon his person. An envelope was found in one of his pockets addressed to A. E. Bourquin, Los Angeles, in care of the Soldiers Home.

Burns is not thought to be the real name of deceased, but it is believed he is the son of Bourquin, he having told one of the witnesses that such was the
