Motion for New Trial.

In the case of John Bock vs. the City of Astoria, which was recently decided favorably to the plaintiff, a motion for a new trial was filed yesterday in the circuit court. The motion sets forth different reasons for a retrial of the case, among them being that the city charter exempts liabilities for damages for injuries sustained on the street; that the court erred in restraining testimony by the defendant in regard to street improvements made and its financial condition and in permitting the advancement of testimony by the plaintiff that was beside the question.

Big Game Aboard.

The steamer Allanco, which came down from Portland yesterday and was unable to cross out, has on board a small herd of five elk. They were brought to Portland by rail and are destined for a park in Los Angeles, Cal. The band consists of a full grown male and female and three younger ones. They are confined in stalls on the deck of the steamer, and in their close quarters appear quite tame, though the female, when first placed aboard, vaulted clear over the top of her narrow stall and over the head of a man standing near, creating quite a sensation. The buck has lately lost his big antlers, the stumps being still unhealed.

Planted Shade Trees.

The ladies of the Woman's club adjourned in a body from their hall yesterday afternoon to the court house block, in front of which they planted a row of young maple trees. This is a step in the crusade the ladies have begun for beautifying the city and ridding it of some of its unsightliness. While all the men who commented on the action of the women did not agree as to the desirability of shade trees in the streets, they were a unit in praising the heroic spirit shown in bravely carrying out the tasks to which they have assigned themselves in spite of March showers or masculine criticism. The trees were paid for by the ladies themselves. The large holes in the new macadam street were presented by big-hearted Sheriff Linville, who allowed a county prisoner to excavate them. A sack of fertilizer for each tree was donated by Butcher Christensen. Kind Providence, always on hand so generously in this favored country, furnished copious showers to moisten

the soil, and the trees were placed in position by a team from the high school consisting of James Robb, Mervin Lounsbury, Harry Allen, Will Carlson, David Hood, and Alex Gilbert.

It was the intention of the ladies to proceed to the McClure school and plant a large quantity of flower and other seeds, which have been donated for the purpose by Mrs. W. S. Robb, but owing to unfavorable weather the enterprise was postponed until Arbor day.

At the meeting of the club Mesdames P. A. Stokes, W. O. Barnes and H. G. Van Dusen were elected delegates to the state federation of women's clubs, which meets in Astoria in June. The subject for the afternoon was "Arbor Day," chairman, Mrs. W. L. Robb. Mr. Brewer gave two vocal solos accompanied by Miss Fox. A very entertaining and helpful article on the work accomplished in San Francisco by the Art league in beautifying that city by the planting of flowers and trees was read by Mrs. Barnes. The ladies are much encouraged and enthused in their work and mean to adhere to their purpose.

The A. O. U. W.

Grand Master William Smith of Baker City will be in Astoria next Saturday the guest of Seaside lodge, A. O. U. W. At their meeting last evening the Workmen gave to two worthy members of the order the 440 realized from the entertainment given a week ago. The lodge also passed resolutions thanking Pacific lodge and Charity lodge, Degree of Honor, and all others who assisted in making the entertainment a success, particularly mentioning A. R. Cyrus, who loaned the piano used.

Schley in Portland.

Admiral W. S. Schley has declined a public reception during his stay in Portland and will be privately entertained by the members of the Scottish Rite. Much to the regret of Masons there all preparations for a reception at the Hotel Portland on Monday had to be abandoned on receipt this morning of a telegram from Colonel W. F. Tucker, now in San Francisco, intimating that the admiral, owing to his limited time, did not want any public ceremony. However, Monday night will see all members of the Scottish Rite assembled to pay honor to their illustrious brother, and the party will be shown the city from carriages and every effort will be made to make their stay pleasant. The admiral will arrive in Portland tomorrow at 7:30 and leave for Puget sound the same evening at 11:30.

We Want a Road.

In the combined districts of Knappa and Stevens an immense fertile belt extends southward from the Columbia river. This land is, with few exceptions, neither rugged nor mountainous, but forms an undulating plain divided here and there by strips of rich bottom lands and silvery streams. Now, although this country is closely intersected by roads in all states of repair, there is not a single outlet by road to Astoria, the only market town, but 12 miles away at the farthest. There is surely need of a county road here, for although the farmer can get his products to the railroad in the summer season, he also divides his profits with the railroad company. Here truly lies a strip of farming land equal, if not superior, to any in the vicinity of Portland, and in justice to the inhabitants there and in the interest of Astoria, a strong effort should be put forth to establish a line of communication by wagon road. The above communication is gladly given publicity because it affects a large and important population, and a vital interest of the city of Astoria as well. A road that could be traveled at all times of the year, connecting this farming country with its natural trading point, would mean dollars to all interested parties.

Salem Won.

Herman Wise, the bowling enthusiast, received a private phone last night to the effect that the Ilihes club had won all four games in the bowling contest with the Commercial club team of Astoria, bowled in Salem. The score was 335 to 323.

Placed Under Quarantine.

In addition to the smallpox cases reported yesterday in the Schroeder family, another case was discovered yesterday and the home of the patient was placed under quarantine. The new case is in the home of Jacob Utzinger, 1633 Grand avenue, Mr. Utzinger's son Edward being down with the disease. The case, like all the others, is of mild type and it is not deemed probable that it will terminate seriously. The Utzingers and Schroeders are neighbors and there is no doubt in the minds of the health officers but that the new case is the result of neighborhood infection.

Will Extradite Jarvi.

A dispatch from Salem last night says: "Governor Chamberlain has issued a requisition upon Governor Brady of Alaska for the return of Matti Jarvi, who has been located in the vicinity of Douglas City, Alaska, and is wanted in Astoria to answer to the charge of murder. Jarvi, the application for the requisition charges, on March 14, 1902, shot and killed his father, Gabriel Jarvi, while the latter was trying to gain admittance to the house in which they both resided, at an early hour in the morning. Young Jarvi was arrested and arraigned before the court and was admitted to bail. But before the time for his trial arrived he jumped his bail and fled to parts unknown." Sheriff Linville, who has been appointed state's agent, left here some days ago with the papers and is expected to return in a few days with his man.

The Knappton mill is shut down on account of the high price of logs, so said. When logs are hauled by rail from Shoalwater bay to the Columbia and then towed to Portland and cut into lumber with profit, it is difficult to understand why a mill on the lower river should be allowed to remain idle. The fact of the Knappton mill having no rail connection and hence being unable to reach eastern markets is said to account for it, prices in ports reached by sailing vessels not being sufficiently high to justify supplying them.
