Preparations for Fishing

A fact which may have much to do with the size of the coming season's pack is the evident scarcity of fishermen as compared with former years. How far the traps and seines will make up for their absence remains to be seen. Owing to the scarcity of fishermen fewer boats have been built by the cannery during the past winter than since the industry has been in existence. Only about 50 fishing boats have been constructed, and several of them are for Alaska. Six gasoline launches have been built for cannery tenders. Fishermen are now putting their boats into the water to tighten up, and getting nets ready to tan and bluestone. Nine more days

Crushed By a Logging Train

Young Man in Cathlamet Company Instantly Killed in a Shocking Manner.

Robert George, a young man of about 22 years, was instantly killed at six o'clock last evening while trying to board a moving train on the road of the Cathlamet Logging company, on the Elokomon.
George, who had been running a donkey engine in the camp, had finished his day's work, and with others was on his way from the woods. As a log train was going by he thought to have a ride on the engine and jumped for it, but missed his hold and fell between the cars and an old roll-way, where he was crushed to death instantly.
The train, which was running at the rate of 10 miles an hour, was stopped at once, and the body was removed to the landing and taken to his home at St. Helens on the steamer Lurline. His father is also an engineer in the same camp, and was a witness to his son's death.
Deceased was a nephew of Chas. Muckle of St. Helens.

SENATOR FULTON IS HOME
