tion of the mob, and later tonight hundreds again assembled and rioted through the negro section of the city, burning houses and stoning negroes, and finally drove every negro from the confines of Joplin. The police were powerless.

Mormons Name Missionaries

Kansas City, April 15.—The annual conference of the church of the reorganized Church of the Latter Day Saints assigned the 12 apostles to fields as follows:

F. M. Sheehy and W. W. Greene, Eastern states Nova Scotia and New Brunswick; Herman C. Smith, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin; F. M. Smith, Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska and North and South Dakota; W. H. Kelley, Rocky Mountain division; Joseph Luff, Colorado, Nevada and Arizona; C. F. Griffiths, Oregon, Washington and British Columbia; J. W. White, Missouri, Kansas and Indian Territory; John W. Flutshorn, British Isles; Peter Anderson, Scandinavia; J. W. Wright and C. H. Butterworth, Australasia. Besides these nearly 400 ministers were appointed to other places throughout the United States and many foreign countries. The church numbers about 75,000 and is scattered very widely throughout the world. The conference reaffirmed its condemnation of polygamy, declaring that the book of Mormon forbids the practice. The conference adjourned to meet next year at Kirtland, Ohio.

MAKES PINK COMPLEXIONS

Chicago, April 15.—A dispatch to the Record-Herald from Washington says: Officials of the Department of Agriculture, familiar with the food test being conducted by Dr. Wiley, say the pink complexion taken on by the young men who are the subjects of experiments are not due to chemicals in the food, but to the complete elimination of all impurities from the blood brought out by eating pure food alone. No drugs have been mixed with the food for the last few weeks in order that Dr. Wiley might observe the contrast in the effect of the pure food and that adulterated with borax and other chemicals. Up to date, it is said, the chemicals have been found to be absolutely harmless and in several cases they have been found beneficial. The subjects only eat at stated times with the greatest regularity as to amount, drink nothing alcoholic and smoke only with the greatest moderation.

BEAUTY AND PURITY

Ancient and Modern Ideas on the Subject. Time and Disease the Effacing Agents of Beauty. What Has Science Done to Restore the Lily and the Rose?

Scarcely called beauty a short-lived transient, Plato a privilege of nature, Theophrastus a delightful prejudice, Theophrastus a silent charm, Carneades a solitary kingdom, Homer a glorious gift of nature, Ovid a favor of the gods. Aristotle affirmed that beauty was better than all the letters of recommendation in the world, and yet none of these distinguished authorities has left us even a hint of how beauty is to be perpetuated, or the ravages of age and disease defied.
