### THE SHANGHAI CASE.

The trial of Patrick J. Lynch, charged with kidnaping Charles W. Gardner on the ship Foyledale a month ago, and Theodore Tobisson, charged with signing Gardner's name to the ship's articles, occupied the time of the circuit court all day yesterday. A jury was chosen consisting of T. B. Morrison, Chris. Schmidt, R. Basel, B. F. Coffey, Andrew Birch, J. F. Bartholomew, John Hanson, G. F. Parker, F. E. Wright, C. P. Looney, Saml. Adair and B. F. Allen. The state completed its case with the examination of eight witnesses during the afternoon and evening. The defense, conducted by Judge F. D. Winton and C. J. Curtis, will introduce its evidence this morning. It is a subject of remark that the jury selected is composed of men of unusual qualifications, considering that it is a criminal case. The usual slighting statements concerning Jurymen do not hold good, as each is a business man of excellent character and ability. The case for the state as presented by Prosecuting Attorney Harrison Allen, showed the utmost care and discernment in its preparation, coupled with the recognized skill of the defense and the notoriety of the case itself kept the courtroom packed with eager spectators during the entire time.

### HONOR TO WHOM HONOR.

In justice to the Woman's Christian Temperance Union the ladies of the Woman's Club desire to correct a statement made by an esteemed evening contemporary to the effect that the Woman's Club had organized a club for boys. That honor belongs to the W. C. T. U. and the former had nothing to do with it. The Woman's Club did, however, at the request of the president of the W. C. T. U. communicate with the Chief of Police on the subject of the enforcement of the curfew ordinance for the very reason mentioned in the article referred to that failure to enforce the ordinance against small boys being on the streets after eight o'clock permits them to congregate in the club rooms conducted by the W. C. T. U., and largely prevents the attendance there of older boys for whom the club was intended.

### MR. ALLEN HAS WHEELS.

It is evident that a bicycle thief is abroad in this city or its immediate vicinity. Tuesday afternoon a young man called at Frank Woodfield's bicycle depot on Bond street. He rented a wheel, saying that if the bicycle suited him he would buy it. It is supposed the wheel gave perfect satisfaction for the mysterious customer has not yet returned it. He also rented one from Max Strahl under similar conditions the same day, and Mr. Strahl is likewise short a bicycle. The man gave his name as Allen. He is a stranger to those who dealt with him and nothing has been seen or heard of him since he gallily rode away. The police have the matter in hand and they are looking for a pleasant voiced young man by the name of Allen who is in the interesting business of stealing bicycles.

### BURNED TO WATER'S EDGE.

Advices from Japan received at Honolulu on the Pacific mail steamer China state that the derelict British ship Fanny Kerr was sighted on March 22 by the British ship Henthedene. When sighted the derelict was in latitude 21.34 north, longitude 123.14 west. Smoke was issuing from the hull of the vessel and all her masts were gone. The Fanny Kerr bound from Newcastle, Australia, for San Francisco, was abandoned off Honolulu nine months ago and this is the first time that the vessel has been sighted since her master and crew deserted her. The ship was on fire when she was abandoned and that she is still afloat is probably due to the fact that she has a steel hull.

### DIED FROM INJURIES.

Rudolph Larson, who fell from the roadway on Eighteenth street to the rocks on the beach below, a distance of about 17 feet, on March 24 last, died on Wednesday night from injuries received. Larson was 48 years of age, and leaves a wife and four children. Coroner Pohl deemed it unnecessary to hold an inquest. The funeral will be held from the undertaker's parlors at 12 o'clock today under the auspices of the Woodmen of the World, Rev. Wm. Seymour Short officiating. The burial will be at Greenwood.
