DEATH OF MR. GROSSMAN.

She was 20 years of age. The funeral will be held tomorrow from the family residence, 706 Corbett street, and the interment will be in Lone Fir cemetery.

THE UNIQUE THEATER.

A MINATURE OPERA HOUSE
 The little vaudeville house which will have its grand opening this evening was all ablaze with electricity last night and presented a handsome scene. The Unique is gotten up in elegant style as a permanent place of amusement. A splendid show is on the program for the opening and for every night afterwards.
 Several reels of films and illustrated song slides were used last night by the vitagraph operator for the purpose of testing the machine and other electrical appliances, which were found to be perfect and the public is assured that no better life motion pictures were ever shown than those to be seen tonight at the Unique theater.

A COAST TRADING VESSEL.

The schooner Gerald C. is expected to arrive at Astoria in a week or ten days from San Pedro, where she was purchased recently by Capt. F. E. Dodge. She will be at once put in commission as a coast trader, to operate between Astoria and points on the Oregon coast south of Tillamook, such as Siletz, Nestucca, Netarts, and Sinslaw. Engineer Chas. H. Deane, of Warrenton left Astoria last evening to take charge of her engine. The Gerald C. is a schooner similar to the Anita, but smaller, and was built in 1885 in the same yard as the Anita. Her length is 58 ft., 5 in., breadth 15 ft., depth 5 ft., 2 in., gross tonnage 31, and net tonnage 24. She is equipped with a gasoline engine as auxiliary to her sails, which makes a good combination for a boat intended for that purpose. Although small, the Gerald C. is said to be a good carrier, and as Captain Dodge is one of the most skillful Oregon bar pilots she should do a good business during the summer, largely increasing the trade of Astoria merchants and helping to make these points tributary to Astoria. They at present have no regular transportation service, part of them depending mostly on getting supplies by wagon over the mountains. There is also a large amount of produce to be marketed from these little ports, so that the boat will have a load each way and should prove a great success.

STEAMERS FOR GREENWOOD

The steamers R. Miller and Mayflower will leave Ross, Higgins & Co's wharf at 1:30 p. m. today for Greenwood cemetery. Fare for the round trip 25 cents. Tickets for sale at the wharf, and must be procured before going on board. Steamers will land at the Fishermen's Cooperative cannery both ways. The Red Men an dtheir families, Women of Woodcraft, Degree of Pocahontas will go on these boats. Those who go out on the morning boat may buy tickets for the return trip on these boats on the wharf at Greenwood.
