MUST PAY IN FULL.

In the state circuit court at Portland Judge Fraser has rendered a decision favorable for plaintiff in the case of James W. Welch against C. W. Shively and wife and M. J. Kinney. This was an action brought to recover a balance due on two promissory notes executed by the defendants toward a fund created for the purpose of insuring a right of way for the Astoria & Columbia River railway at the time the road was built to this city. The defense set up the claim that the purposes for which the subsidy had been created had been fulfilled without the necessity of paying the amounts still due on their notes. Welch brought the action on an assigned claim.

ALDERBROOK EXERCISES.

Particularly good exercises were given by the Alderbrook school Friday afternoon in observance of Memorial day. There were 40 visitors present among them being a delegation from the G. A. R. and members of the Woman's Relief Corps. Miss Mamie Clinton on behalf of the last named organization addressed the school. Flags, bunting and flowers decorated the room, profusely and with taste. Prof. Stupp and his two efficient assistants Miss Lewis and Miss O'Neill deserve great credit for the excellent program of songs, drills, recitations, etc., participated in by 80 trained pupils.

DEATH OF MRS. C. L. PARKER.

Word was received here late last night from Seaside announcing the death of Mrs. C. L. Parker. Mrs. Parker formerly resided here but the family moved away about eight years ago and since then have been either in the east or in Portland. For the past five weeks Mrs. Parker has been at Seaside. For the past year she has been a sufferer from consumption and the end was looked for. C. L. Parker is the youngest brother of H. B. and Freeman Parker of this city. Many years ago he conducted a grocery store on Bond street, but for some time has been retired from active business affairs. His wife was a daughter of the late Mrs. Elizabeth McGregor, and W. F. McGregor of this city is a brother. She is survived by a husband and four daughters, three of whom are in the east attending school. No arrangements for the funeral have been made but it is believed the services will be held here with interment in Greenwood.

DEATH OF MRS. WRIGHT.

Mrs. Robert C. Wright, daughter of the late Judge J. H. D. Gray, died at the home of her mother in this city at 12 o'clock last night. Mrs. Wright had been a sufferer for a year past, being afflicted with a stomach trouble, and the end was expected. She had been here since last Sunday night. Mr. Wright is an attorney of Portland. He will arrive down this forenoon and until then the funeral arrangements will not be made. Mrs. Wright was born in this city 25 years ago. Her education was obtained in this city and for some time previous to her marriage she taught in the local schools. Two years ago she was married to Mr. Wright and since then has made her home in Portland. Mrs. Wright did not suffer greatly during her illness, and was conscious until the last.

Memorial Day Observed

Weather Was Perfect And Vast Growds Visited Gemetaries-- Exercises Well Attended

Not less than 500 people visited the cemeteries yesterday assisting in the decoration of graves of the soldier dead and paying tribute also to the memory of their own loved ones and to the memory of deceased members of fraternal organizations. The day was perfect and nothing occurred to mar its serenity.

The steamers R. Miller, Mayflower, Jordan and a large barge conveyed crowds from the city to Greenwood, and many went by huggies, carriages and wagons from all the surrounding country. A considerable number also visited Clatsop and Ocean View cemeteries on the west side.

The following communication answers for the manner in which the day was observed by the patriotic order:

Astoria, May 30—Editor Astorian: The graves of the following named comrades were decorated today in Greenwood cemetery: Comrades Rawlings, Spear, Elliott, Grube, Pifer, Weyland Cronk and Osgood. Also the grave of Frank Bourquin of the Spanish-American war, by members of the Cushing post, ladies of the G. A. R. and the Woman's Relief Corps.

All but two of the soldiers' graves are properly marked with neat monuments furnished by the government, and all are neatly cared for by the post. They were the most beautifully decorated graves in the cemetery yesterday. Concomitantly I. O. R. M. held services over the graves in its plot in Greenwood. The address was delivered by C. E. Foster. A handsome monument was unveiled at the grave of Mrs. Katherine Feeley by the Women of Woodcraft with the services of the ritual of the order. Other organizations also were represented in the honors paid to the dead.

SERVICES AT THE HALL.

The memorial exercises at Foard & Stokes hall began yesterday afternoon at 2:30 and continued until 5 o'clock. The hall was well filled children particularly being in evidence. The program was largely made up of the programs rendered during the week by the pupils of the various schools. Among the selections by the smaller children the fairy exercise by a number of girls of Miss Oleson's room, McClure, may be mentioned as being extra fine. The speaker of the day was Hon. George Noland and he delivered a 20-minute address full of patriotism in the course of which he paid glowing tributes to the brave men to whose memory the day is set apart. An orchestra of six pieces delighted the large audience with several selections. The exercises of the day concluded with the national anthem, "America," in which the audience joined with strength and feeling.

During the past two days the run of salmon has been slightly improved. A number of boats brought in from 400 to 500 pounds each. The canneries are ahead of the pack of last year at this date and the cold storages have far in excess of that amount.

They intend to get together and do some whole some work, after which a return match may be arranged.
