INDIANS DESTROYED NETS.

They Had Warned the Packers Not to Place Equipment.

Tacoma, June 6.—The Chilkat Indians have cut and destroyed the big salmon nets placed in position in Lynn canal by the Alaska Packers' association and the Pacific Packing and Navigation company. During May the Chilkats warned the salmon canners that they must not plant their nets until the Indians had finished catching outahon, on which they depend for their early summer supply of fish. Their warning not being heeded, the Chilkats last week landed a number of war canoes and went out into deep water near Haines, where they cut and tore up all the salmon nets they could find. The Indians want all the salmon nets kept out of the water entirely until they have plenty of opportunity to use their own nets in securing a large quantity of outahon, both for present needs and for drying for a winter supply.

THEY DIED FRIENDS.

Desperate Duel Between Marshal and Citizen Ended in Death.

El Paso, Tex., June 6.—Two men are dead another is dying as the result of another Texas duel, last night at Eagle Lake, when City Marshal Kinard and Will McDow shot each other to death and Iperce Hammond, a bystander received a mortal wound. Kinard was trying to quiet McDow, when McDow shot him through. Kinard fell dying, but raised himself and shot McDow. As he fell, McDow said: "We are both done for, but let us die friends." They shook hands and died.

COALING STATIONS LEASED.

Agreement Submitted by Palma to Ambassador Squires.

Havana, June 6.—President Palma has submitted to United States Minister Squires the tentative terms offered by Cuba of the agreement covering the leases of the naval coaling stations to the United States. It is now believed that the agreement will be signed next week.

MOTION DENIED.

New York, June 6.—The appellate division of the supreme court has handed down a decision affirming an order of the lower court denying a motion for a preliminary writ of mandamus to compel the reinstatement of Camille Weldenfeld as a member of the New York stock exchange. Weldenfeld was suspended for a year because of his connection with the Peter Powers-Northern Securities case.

FOR FLOOD SUFFERERS.

Topeka, June 6.—Tonight the total collected money for the flood sufferers is something like \$205,000. It was then discovered that the handles had been removed from the casket. Later in the day cremation was to have taken place and when the fires were started in the furnaces an explosion followed, blowing out the back part of the structure. Two workmen who started the fire narrowly escaped death.

MISS MORRISON IN PEN.

Topeka, June 6.—The Kansas supreme court today refused to grant a new trial in the case of Jessie Morrison, sentenced to the penitentiary for the murder of Clara W. W. Castle, three years ago. Miss Morrison, who was out on bail, has been taken to the penitentiary.

SCHOOL TEACHER LYNCHED.

Belleville, Ill., June 6.—W. T. Wyatt, a negro school teacher, was lynched tonight by a mob for shooting and mortally wounding County Superintendent Chas. Hertel. Before the negro was dead he was cut down from the telegraph pole and burned to death.

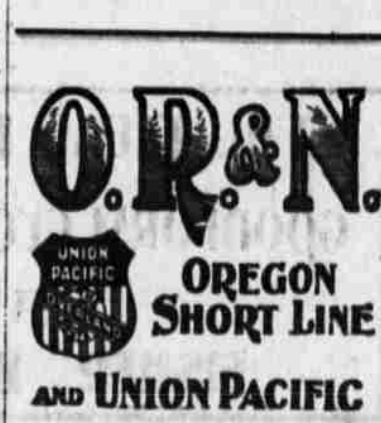
