**To Have Rooms
 On Commercial**
 For Convenience Of Business Men
 Progressive Club Decides To Establish New Quarters.

The announcement that the Progressive Club is about to vacate the premises that it now occupies in conjunction with the Chamber of Commerce was the principal feature of the meeting of that body last night. The step has been decided upon in consequence of the present location which was, when originally selected, in the heart of the business section, not being convenient for merchants and others whose offices are on Commercial street, where the new rooms of the club will be situated.
 The committee appointed by the club to arrange for the excursion which it is hoped will finally end the deficit in the fund established to pay for the spur to the wash and door factory is hard at work, and a definite reply from the A. & C. R. R. is expected today.
 It was reported by the secretary that the annual payment of \$250 towards the purchase of a park had been made.
 The regatta committee is hard at work, and is meeting with success.

FLAGS TO WAVE MONDAY.

The local camp, Woodmen of the World, makes the request that all business and residence houses, as far as possible, display the National emblem on Monday, June 15. June 14 is Flag Day. This is the day set apart by an act of congress in commemoration of the day upon which the Stars and Stripes was formally selected as the emblem of the land of the free and the home of the brave.
 June 2, 1898, the American Flag Association was formed. The flag had been improperly used, but there were many loyal citizens who thought it should be held sacred and not put to uses which would teach young America to look upon its folds with less reverence than it was regarded by themselves. It was becoming common to see it used as a trade mark as advertising a special brand of cigars, and in other ways it was put to uses which degraded and desecrated it. The object of the American Flag Association was to prevent these abuses, and to secure a general celebration of June 14 as "Flag Day" because on that day in the year 1777 congress selected the flag of the United States.
 Both of the purposes for which the association was formed have been accomplished. The putting of the flag to ignoble uses has been stopped and June 14 has been set apart by congress to be observed as "Flag Day" all over the United States. Inasmuch as June 14 this year falls on a Sunday, Monday, the 15th, has been selected as "Flag Day."
 Every lodge of Woodmen of the World in the state is taking similar action, and on June 15 "Old Glory" will wave from thousands of house-tops and mastheads in Oregon.

STARTS WORK AT ONCE.

William Morris, United States Assistant Engineer, will leave this morning for The Dalles with a party of 15, for the purpose of surveying the 8 1/2-mile canal at Celilo recommended by the Board of Army Engineers. A survey of a continuous canal was made in 1883, but the new one will be along somewhat different lines. Borings will be made along the route to ascertain the character of the material through which the excavation is to be made. The canal will be about 8 1/2 miles long, and will contain several locks, one at the upper end and perhaps two at the lower end. It will be probably 65 feet wide at the bottom, and will be lined with concrete. The minimum depth of water will be something like seven feet. A large part of the canal will have to be hewn out of rock. The canal will be on the river side of the O. R. & N., and for most of its length will parallel the track of that company. The Oregon portage road will closely follow the line of the canal. The Columbia river, at low water, falls 77 feet between the head of Celilo Falls and Big Eddy. At high water the fall is about 10 feet. The cost of the work is likely to be under \$10,000,000 rather than above that sum.

BEARISH RESIDENT CHARGED WITH SWINDLING LAWYER.

He said to Have Obtained Money by Giving Order on Mechanic Mill After Drawing Pay.
 On the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, Phil Le Roy, of Seaside, will have a hearing in the justice court this afternoon at 3 o'clock. Le Roy worked for some time in the Nockicum Spruce Lumber company's mill at Seaside, but quit several days ago on account of an injury to his finger. He is alleged to have given Lawyer & Company, of Seaside, an order on the mill company for \$15, which he said was due him for wages. Before this time he had, it is alleged, drawn all the money that was to his credit in the mill.
 Le Roy maintains that he had some money to his credit when he gave the order to Lawler.
