FINED BY UNION.

Hat Men Alleged to Have Swindled Employees.

New York, June 15.—Accused of attempting to extort money from employees in Newark, N. J., hat factory, David Richman has been fined \$800.99 by the hatmakers' union. About eight months ago similar charges were made against Richman and he was fined \$89.95. He was then foreman of a department in the factory. Although he declared at the time that the charges were trumped up, it is said he has since been paying the fine in weekly installments out of his wages. He declares that the new charges are trumped up and that he will not pay the second fine. Just why the union made the fine one cent less instead of an even \$1000, none in the case will explain. The complainants asserted before the union that Richman had asked them to pay him \$2 a week out of their wages. They also declared that they know he was receiving money from other men in the shop. Richman, they said, told them that the money was to go to the firm.

FORTUNE FOR INDIANS.

Brisk Competition Between Rival Pellet Buyers Raises Prices.

Tacoma, June 15.—The Sitka Indians have gained an additional \$6000, which is a good sized fortune to them, by the active competition of fur dealers to secure their catch of sealskins, amounting to about 500 skins. By active bidding, prices were raised from \$10 to \$22.50 per skin with little regard to the average quality of skins brought forward. When the pelts began to arrive this year a Portland buyer took the field against the firm in Sitka, which for years had control of the trade. As a result of the rivalry in the bidding the price was jumped to \$22.50 per skin to the advantage of the Indians.

NO TIME FOR UNIONISM.

Agitator Who Talked Strike Narrowly Escaped Violence.

Kansas City, June 15.—A man who claims to be T. H. Hager, a union carpenter from Hannibal, Mo., narrowly escaped violence at the hands of West Bottom flood sufferers while he was trying to induce the freighthandlers of the Missouri Pacific railroad company to go on strike for the full recognition of their union. People who had lost their all and who are depending on freight shipments for relief were bitter in their denunciation of Hager's action and only the prompt action of the police in arresting him saved him from their wrath. At the police station Hager tried to commit suicide.

Kansas City, June 15.—The body of William Heisler, who was drowned May 31, while rescuing his wife from their home in the east bottom, was found last night. Heisler, who was 73 years old, with a horse and wagon had rescued several women and children before he made the trip for his wife. A swift current overturned the wagon and Heisler was drowned. His wife clung to passing driftwood and was rescued a mile down the river.
