Build Railway and Cannery Two Alaska Rivers to Be Exploited by Yakutat Company.

A railway is to be constructed from Yakutat bay to the Setteck river in Alaska by the Yakutat and Southern company, which will later extend the line to the Alek river. Mail advices from Seattle are to the effect that ten miles of the road will build this year, and a cannery will then be erected on Yakutat bay.

Captain Mosler, who has made an expert investigation into salmon fishing in Alaska, gives the Setteck and Ahnakkli rivers, which are connected at their outlets, very favorable mention in his recently published report.

Vancouver, June 17.—Every section of low-lying land along the banks of the Fraser river which is not dyked is now under water. At Mission the people are moving household goods to higher ground. Harrison river is raging and a volume of water is hourly increasing.

LITERARY MAN DROWNED. Binghamton, N. Y., June 17.—The body of the Rev. Robert Emmett Hall, widely known on account of his literary talent, has been found in the Susquehanna river here. He was brought from Connecticut to the state hospital for the insane here a year ago. He recently escaped and it is thought fell into the river.

OREGON'S EXHIBIT PLEASES.

"Oregon may be said to have acquitted itself very well at the Osaka exhibition," says the Kobe (Japan) Chronicle, "and the section generally is one of which neither the state nor the country at large need be ashamed. It would no doubt have been a good thing for the trade of America could the United States government have been represented, and Oregon's enterprise will doubtless meet with the result aimed at—the expansion of trade (which is already very considerable) between Oregon and Japan. There is, of course, direct steamship communication between Kobe, Astoria, and Portland, and which minimizes freight rates; and, since the opening of the exhibition, Colonel Doseh has established a commercial agency in Japan for handling the goods imported from Oregon. Some influential and wealthy Japanese have become interested in this agency so that large quantities of the products of Oregon will be handled and a good supply be always available in the country. A considerable increase in the trade is therefore anticipated as a result of the exhibition.

"One portion of the section is devoted to such articles as preserved fruits and butter, etc., of which Oregon can provide some of the very best." Colonel Doseh thinks the Japanese government should try the celebrated Oregon evaporated prunes in connection with the food for the army and navy. They contain certain properties which prevent scurvy, and this malady has been practically stamped out of the United States army and navy since the authorities have made Oregon prunes a regular part of the men's diet."
