FIRST DAY OF STATE FEDERATION

(Continued from third page.)

Action has changed from the city by the beautiful Willamette, to your hospitable shores, the queen city by the sea.

As the Willamette runs into the Columbia and from there streams into the great Pacific to reach other shores and continents so the good and earnest thoughts from various centers of our state stream into this assembly to be gathered and perpetuated here that they also may pass unto other spheres of thought and thus down the endless stream of time.

Ladies, there never was a time when there was a greater call for women to identify themselves with every cause for good, to uplift the fallen, strengthen the feeble, to help the needy and inspire the faltering. Our clubs and their constituents here send us to represent them in just such work and to further the welding and cementing of women's organizations. Let us cast aside all personal feelings, all that is frivolous and petty, to unite for the best interests of Oregon clubland and the broadening of our minds and sympathies. And though our own fine state is dear to our heart, though we wear the red, white and blue and are very loyal to our nation, we stand for more than that, yes, in confluence of heart and mind and soul we stand for, let us hope, one and all, for service to humanity and love and fealty and service to our God above.
