ALASKAN CANNERYMEN PROTEST—Skagway advises that the cannerymen of southeastern Alaska have a genuine grievance against the United States government, owing to the fact that the law prohibiting fishing for salmon prior to July 1, has worked a hardship on all the canneries. The hitherto profitable business of supplying the king salmon to the market is now practically a thing of the past. Cannerymen are unanimously of the opinion that the law should be abolished or changed to permit fishing earlier in the year. Another problem that the cannerymen are willing or able to cope with is the government regulation enforcing the selection of hatchery sites and the propagation of the red fish by the cannerymen themselves. The consensus of opinion among the cannerymen is that the government should operate all hatcheries and tax the canneries for their maintenance.
