DEATH OF FAMOUS PREACHER

DR. EDWARD WARREN, RECTOR OF ST. JAMES' EPISCOPAL CHURCH, NEW YORK, EXPIRES IN AUSTRIA.
New York, July 25.—Dr. Edward Warren, rector of St. James' Episcopal church of this city, is dead in Austria from appendicitis.
Dr. Warren came to this country from England in 1853 when he was called to conduct a mission. He returned to Europe but later was called by another church as rector. On his arrival, however the contract labor law was applied to him as a test case and a fine of \$1,000 was imposed, but when the case was taken to the supreme court the decision was in favor of the clergy man and the church, it being held that he was exempt as a public speaker.

TWO CHINESE SURRENDER
Buffalo, N. Y., July 25.—Young Far and Young J. L. Chinese who have lived in Titillville eight years or more came to this city recently to buy their passage back to China. While here celestial friends explained to them the workings of the exclusion law and the two surrendered to the Federal authorities, claiming they were here illegally. The government will have to send them back to China and the wily pair thus save the cost of their transportation.

FOR GREAT AUTOMOBILE RACE.
Buffalo, N. Y., July 25.—Harry Unwin, secretary of the National Association of Automobile Manufacturers, has arrived here, after a trip across the state, to choose the route for the great international endurance test of automobiles which will be held in October, between New York and Cleveland. Mr. Unwin has chosen the route for the distance between New York and Buffalo. It is divided into four days' travel.

GUILTY OF ESPIONAGE.
Montgomery, Ala., July 25.—The jury in the case of the United States against R. N. Franklin, charged with causing Pat Hill, a negro, to be held in a condition of espionage, today brought in a verdict of guilty. Judge James assessed the minimum fine, \$1,000, which was immediately paid.
