FROM THE PEOPLE

Editor Astorian:

In response to your invitation to attorneys for a legal opinion as to when and under what circumstances an officer, either elective or appointive, becomes vacant, I submit the following:

First—On the demise of the incumbent.

Second—On his resignation of the same filed with the appointive power or properly constituted authorities.

Third—By moving out of the city, county or state, with no present intention of returning.

Fourth—When the officer physically and mentally able refuses or neglects to discharge the duties incumbent on him by reason of such office or trust to the detriment of his colleagues or constituents.

FAMOUS COACH TO BE SOLD

FINEST PALACE CAR IN THE WORLD AT ITS TIME, TURNED OVER TO RECEIVER

New York, July 29.—A receiver was appointed in the chancery court at Newark, N. J., for a single palace car. It is called the Boston and at the time it was built was known as one of the finest in existence and was widely exhibited. Later it became famous by remaining sidetracked for almost two years near Springfield, Mass., while the ownership was being fought in the courts. All that time a colored porter and his wife stuck to the car.

The litigation grows out of a transfer made to a New Englander, who holds a mortgage on the property and the court has instructed the receiver, whose bond was fixed at \$10000, to sell the coach.
