

SALVAGE IS GRANTED

Philadelphia, July 30.—For their heroic work in rescuing the Spanish steamship Erosa in a storm off Bermuda, in February, 1902, the members of the crew of the American steamship Yocman will receive \$20,000. After more than a year of litigation Judge McPherson, in the United States district court has decided that the services rendered the Spanish vessel were worth that amount and accordingly entered judgment.

SOLDIERS CREATE TROUBLE

Honolulu, July 30.—(By Pacific Cable)—The people living in the vicinity of the Federal camp have been greatly annoyed recently by the depredations of the mischievous element among the soldiers and complaints have been made to the civil and military authorities. The offenses of the soldiers consist chiefly of appropriating fruits and flowers and a number of raids, after dark on gardens and orchards have been reported. One outcome of the complaints has been a doubling of the guards about the camps and neighborhood and a strict watch will hereafter be maintained to prevent further trouble.

ENCOURAGE IMMIGRATION

Honolulu, July 30.—(By Pacific Cable.)—Governor Dole has appointed T. F. Lansing to be commissioner of immigration. This office is a new one and was created for the purpose of encouraging the coming to the islands of tourists, farmers, laborers and other desirable people.

WELL KNOWN PRINTER DIES

Salt Lake, July 30.—Charles S. Williamson, for 15 years foreman of the Herald composing room and one of the best known printers in the West, died yesterday of consumption. Mr. Williamson was one of the prime movers of the founding of the Childs-Drexel Home for aged and disabled printers at Colorado Springs. He was born in Indiana la' 48 years ago.

CHURCH PEOPLE KILLED.

Lynchburg, Va., July 30.—Three persons were killed and more than a score injured by lightning at New Hope church. Appomattox country, this afternoon. A meeting of the James River Baptists association was in progress and a number of men took refuge from the storm under an awning near the building.

PROTECTS YUKON MINERS.

Tacoma, July 30.—The Yukon council decided last week to allow the miners a prior lien on 50 per cent of the entire output of the Klondike mines. The resolution was subsequently altered to include suppliers of wood in the privilege of filing a prior lien, on the same footing as a laborer in a mine. The new ruling will, it is believed, protect men employed upon mines against the acts of some employers who have not scrupled to adopt all means in their power to avoid paying the men.

BACK DOOR TO ETERNITY

Seattle, July 30.—Peter J. Gessner, for 15 years one of the best known gamblers in Seattle, committed suicide by taking carbolic acid at his home in Georgetown yesterday afternoon. He had disrobed and gone to bed and his apathetic servant who was the only other person in the house thought that he was sleeping. Domestic troubles are supposed to have been the cause of the deed.

ANOTHER IS KILLED

New York, July 30.—It has been learned that the death of John A. Moore, well known Catholic author, which was reported yesterday from the Adirondacks, was the result of an accident. He had gone to see the waterfall near the house at which he was stopping. In passing along the edge of the ravine he stepped into a hole covered by underbrush and fell 200 feet back of his head striking a sharp rock. The injury soon afterward proved fatal.
