MOVING PICTURES TODAY—The Astoria Electric Company has installed 14 powerful electric lights in the Kinney cannery, and the day circuit will be turned on today to enable the photographers who have been in the city for several days awaiting the opportunity, to obtain moving pictures of the cannery while in full operation. The receiving platforms at the cannery are piled high with the plumpiest salmon ever caught, and every man is working at the present time, so that the photographers will be able to cover the industry in every detail. This will be the second time in months that the day circuit has been used, the last time being the occasion of the benefit concert at the opera house for the benefit of the Heppner flood sufferers.

FISH WARDEN'S REPORT—The report of Master Fish Warden Van Dusen submitted yesterday with the fish commissioners shows that the receipts of the office for the month just past amount in all to \$1,205.60. District No. 1 furnished \$1,197.60 and the balance, \$8.00 was collected from district No. 2. Disbursements equal in all \$2,579.34, being for the operation and construction of hatcheries on Columbia, Umpqua and Yaquina rivers. In referring to the work being done on the Ontario hatchery the report says: "At this present time six cars of lumber have gone to the site and the four remaining should go forward the first week in August. Under these conditions I see nothing to delay matters and all should be ready for use according to the contract time. The lumber is being gotten out by the Astoria Box Co. the sash, doors and frames by Geo. Ainslie & Company of Portland; the shingles by the Metcalf Shingle Company of Tacoma, Wash. The nails were gotten from the Honeyman Hardware Company of Portland; the cement, paint, etc., from the W. P. Fuller & Company of Portland." The trouble that had attended the efforts of the warden to obtain a clear title to lands at the Yaquina is referred to in the report that says in part: "At the Yaquina hatchery I have succeeded in getting a title to the lands desired for hatchery purposes and I beg to submit herewith for your approval and acceptance, a deed duly executed by Dr. F. M. Carter and wife, conveying the property desired for the hatchery buildings; and a deed executed by Mr. David B. Ramsdell and wife conveying the property desired for water supply purposes."

AT BEAR RIVER MOUTH—The company of Northern Pacific surveyors that has been working in the vicinity of Ilwaco, has moved to the mouth of Bear river, headed toward the Columbia. The surveyors are now within eight miles of Chinook. They started from South Bend and have surveyed the route through the Nasel country. Just where the line will strike the river is only speculation yet, but from the way they are headed it now looks as though they would come out at or near the old town of Chinook. The line is surveyed down the river from Kalama to Ilwaco, and it is thought the company intends building from South Bend to the Columbia, eight miles east of Ilwaco, and then follow the river to Kalama, where the main line will be struck. The survey has also been made down the river into Ilwaco, and the intention seems to be to build a branch down to Ilwaco and out to the beach to Stockpile harbor to tap that country.

AFRO-AMERICANS ORGANIZE
New York, August 4.—The Afro-American Equal Rights League of the State of New York has been organized at a meeting in Saratoga. Officers were elected and the president was empowered to appoint one person from each congressional district to form an executive board. Associations are expected to be formed in other states.

MUST STAND TRIAL
New York, August 4.—Recorder Goff has declined to entertain a demurrer by Robert Martin and Harry Veithusen who, as officers of the Delaware Surety Company, were indicted for perjury in connection with the Montana Copper Mine litigation. The indictments were found two years ago. Trial was fixed for August 18.

MUST HAVE BILL OF HEALTH.
Salt Lake, Aug. 4.—The Oregon Short Line and Union Pacific railroads have announced that hereafter, owing to a prevalence of "scabby" sheep among flocks of the west, they will only carry consignments of sheep accompanied by clean bill of health from United States bureau of animal industry.

CONTRACT CONVICT LABOR
Lafayette, Ind., August 3.—The Indiana Prison Board, in session at Michigan City, has just opened bids for the first letting of convict labor under the new state law. Four hundred prisoners will be contracted. Seven proposals were received, ranging from 45 to 50 cents per day per man.
