DISEASE BAFFLES EXPERTS

Victim Dies Soon After Being Attacked---Resembles Bubonic

The most eminent pathologists and are working, says the World, 'n conjunctionn with the medical authorities health department of the United States government in an effort to determine the nature of the disease. All details of the investigation are refused.

The disease in many of its symptom resembles bubonic plague, but it is said to be more swift in its progress and nore deadly in its effect.

It first appeared some months ago in the isolated town of Dairquri, Province of Santiago. Men employed in the fron mines in that locality were affected. The disease did not yield to treatment and the mortality was greater than in yellow fever or any kindred disease.

The inhabitants became panic stricken and an American steel company matter. References to the New York read, and Philadelphia experts followed. The description of the disease furnished by the Cuban physicians shows that it presents the worst symptoms of yellow fever, black fever and spotted fever. The patient is usually dead a few hours after first complaining of illness and turns a bright yellow after death.

It is in the death that the disease presents its most horrible phase. The rictims pulse rate rushes to 160, a heart beat which is deemed almost impossible by physicians of experience. The respiration counts 58. These organic disturbances, together with a temperature of 107 and 108, do not cause instant death but the high fever generated

soon burns out life. The disease always attacks persons who have suffered from intermittent malarial fever.

"Therefore, since President Roosevelt has given him charge of the apstate in the Union, and has made him a Negro adviser as to all policies affecting colored Americans in the interest of our race, we call upon President H velt to dispense with Washington as our political spokesman."
