

GERMAN SHIP GOES ASHORE

Professor Koch Struck at Ocean Park, But is Floated.

Los Angeles, Oct. 1.—Mistaking a light shining from a cottage on the shore for a wharf light at Port Los Angeles the ship Professor Koch struck bottom at Ocean Park early this morning and narrowly escaped being wrecked.

The ship was headed straight ashore for the supposed beacon when she struck hard and fast on the sandy bottom.

Tugs hurried to her rescue. The rising tide and smooth sea aided the work of salvage and the ship was finally pulled off.

ORNOXIOUS TO PARISIANS.

Paris, Oct. 1.—The racing world here is greatly agitated about the question of the alleged "drugging" of horses in which American trainers are thought to be especially expert, the public here attributing their wonderful success to this practice.

The Matin this morning publishes an interview with a leading American trainer at Chantilly named Leigh, who emphatically declared that he did not permit drugging at his stables; he considered the practice harmful. He added, however, that American lads here were profiting by the credulity of certain trainers and were selling the nostrums at high prices.

COLD-BLOODED HIGHWAYMEN.

Los Angeles, Oct. 1.—A special from Naco, Ariz., says:

J. W. Dooley, a ranch owner, was knocked on the head and robbed by highwaymen last night and those who committed the deed carried his body to the railroad tracks near by, where they left him in an unconscious condition, expecting him to be killed and his remains so mutilated as to conceal the crime.

Dooley was struck by the first train which passed and dragged a hundred feet, but miraculously escaped instant death. He was picked up by the train crew and carried into Bisbee, where he was placed in the hospital. One arm and a leg had to be amputated and he is injured internally. At last accounts he was reported to be dying, but had recovered consciousness long enough to tell his story.

AFTER GOVERNOR PEABODY.

Colorado Springs, Oct. 1.—Resolutions were adopted by the Colorado Springs Federated Trades Council calling on the citizens of the state, regardless of calling, to demand the impeachment of Governor Peabody for sending the militia to Cripple Creek during a time of profound peace.

MINISTER RELEASED.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 1.—Rev. C. D. Whalen, who was arrested a few days ago on information from Plattsburg, N. Y., charging wife desertion, was released from custody today. A telegram from Plattsburg said that unless the local authorities would guarantee the expenses of witnesses from Plattsburg to Los Angeles, there would be no prosecution from that end. The police promptly released Whalen.

RESERVATION OF THEIR OWN.

Butte, Sept. 1.—(Special)—A large amount of testimony has been taken by United States Commissioner J. W. James at Anaconda in regard to the Rocky Boy tribe of Indians, several members of which are trying to get the tribe together in some part of this state and then have Congress pass a special act giving them a reservation of their own.

PESOS FOR THE PHILIPPINES.

San Francisco, Oct. 1.—The superintendent of the mint has just delivered to the war department 1,000,000 pesos from the Philippines. The coin was taken from the mint under military escort and transferred to the transport Sherman which sails today for Manila.
