Helped Himself To the Bankroll

Man Named Mitchell Under Arrest for Stealing \$40 From Twenty-one Game.

During a lull in business and while the dealer was off his guard at the "21" table in Carlson's place on Commercial street yesterday afternoon, some one raked off \$40.

This occurred about 3:30 o'clock. At 5 o'clock Chief of Police Hallock arrested a drunken man that had piled himself on some boxes in front of Allen's grocery store. It transpired that the drunken man was the one toward whom suspicion pointed as relieving Carlson's place of 40 silver dollars, though it was not known at the time of the arrest.

The arrested man's name is Mitchell, alias Connor, and he has been in the city two or three days, during which time he is said to have been more or less under the influence of liquor. He had spent much of his time at Carlson's and was missed about the time the stack of dollars was missing from the "21" table. A party in Carlson's place observed Mitchell reaching across the table just before his disappearance, but thought nothing of it until it was announced a theft had been committed.

Hearing of an arrest being made the dealer at Carlson's called at the city jail and identified Mitchell and he will be held pending the charge of robbery instead of drunkenness. When arrested Mitchell had on his person \$40, corresponding with the amount taken from Carlson's, though it was in gold, while the money taken from the "21" table was in silver dollars. A companion who had been seen with Mitchell and who left on the Portland train yesterday evening was questioned at the station by Officer Ober. He signed a willingness and was even anxious to remain over to testify against his companion, for, he said, Mitchell had told him he wanted to go to Seattle, but hadn't the money to buy a ticket. The officers have concluded his presence here is very desirable and he probably will be invited to return.

When arrested Mitchell vigorously protested against being taken to jail, notwithstanding he was surcharged with alcoholic drink. He is a husky fellow and Chief Hallock had to call for aid to assist his charge to the city's home for offenders.

BACKING OFF TO FIGHT.

Sofa, Oct. 7.—Premier Petroff, with a view of avoiding the danger of a rupture, has proposed to the Ottoman commissioner here that the troops on both sides of the frontier should be withdrawn to a certain distance agreed upon by both governments, and he has further offered to disband one battalion of Bulgarian troops for every two demobilized simultaneously by Turkey. The latest reports state that some 60,000 Macedonian fugitives are threatened with famine on the approach of winter.

DECISION FAVORS ARTIST.

New York, Oct. 7.—It has been decided by the supreme court that an artist's work cannot be altered without his consent and at the same time have his name attached to it. William De Leftwich Dodge brought an action to prevent the Allied Arts Company and the Tiffany Studios from interfering in any manner or making changes in four mural paintings executed by him now in the lobby of the King Edward hotel, Toronto, Ont. Judge McCaull has granted his application for an injunction, with costs.

LYTLETON ST. JOHN'S MAN.

St. Johns, N. F., Oct. 7.—The appointment of Hon. Alfred Lytleton as secretary for the colonies is warmly welcomed here. The new minister spent a month in Newfoundland last summer, being arbitrator in the claim of the Newfoundland Railway Company against the Newfoundland government. He studied local affairs, visiting the French shore and fully posted himself on colonial issues so that he will be able to consider the Newfoundland question. The government sent him a warm telegram of congratulation.

The board of fish commissioners met Tuesday afternoon, when Master Fish Warden Van Dusen filed his monthly report. He reported the work at the several fish hatcheries as progressing nicely and in each of the older ones a large number of salmon eggs are being hatched, while at the new hatcheries the work of construction is progressing satisfactorily.
