NOVEL ADVERTISING PLAN

Exposition Train to Be Used for the West.

Denver, Oct. 14.—The Great Western Exposition Train Company, capitalized at \$200,000, was incorporated here today. The officers are: President, Hugh Coyle; general manager and treasurer, S. O. Trecoff. The objects of the company are said to be to advertise the resources of Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, Idaho, Oregon, Montana and the great northwest generally, and to attract the attention of tourists and health-seekers. The exposition train will be built in Chicago.

MANILA MARAUDING.

Manila, Oct. 14, 6:30 P. M.—The crew of the boat in which Johnston and Herman, the runaway constabulary officers, accompanied by one constable, started from Guimbal for Cagayan Island, attacked the outlaws on nearing the latter place, killing Johnson and wounding Herman and the constable. Herman killed four of the crew and the other two jumped overboard. He then put back to Negros, where he sent gun and ammunition to the police and abandoned the boat off Nabalva, Bayawan, where he is in hiding when the last was heard of him. On Saturday night last the police captured the boat, recovering a number of constabulary guns, ammunition and some money. They also buried Johnson, whose body was found in the boat. It is presumed that the crew intended to kill the outlaws and secure the money and arms.

CABINET CRISIS SOLVED.

New York, Oct. 14.—The cabinet crisis may be considered solved, says a Herald dispatch from Valparaiso, Chile. All of the ministers, except those of war and navy, will retain their portfolios. Newspapers say the solution was due to one minister, who could not console himself for losing the honors of his post.

The council of state has adopted the president's message convoking congress in extraordinary session, to begin today. The message contains a list of 32 bills or projects, which, if passed, would place Chile on a higher plane among the South American Republics.

SEATTLE BANKER ALARMED.

Troy, N. Y., Oct. 14.—A communication has been received from Seattle, Wash., by Mayor Conway, requesting that officials help in the matter of more equally dividing the sexes of the east and west. The writer gives his name as Gorman and asserts that he is a banker in Seattle. He asserts that there are many young men in that city receiving good salaries and owning their homes who are unable to find help-mates and requests that the mayor take some action in a cause of vital importance to both sexes. Mayor Conway is considering the matter.

WILL MAKE NO INVESTIGATION.

New York, Oct. 14.—While relatives of the first and second wives of Ebenezer S. Lillydenburgh, who is under arrest at Eldora, Ia., on a charge of murdering his third wife, feel that peculiar circumstances surround their taking off, no official steps have been taken regarding the matter.

Only one thing may be done and that is to exhume the bodies which are side by side in the cemetery. District Attorney Clark has declared his readiness to make an investigation if called upon but the second wife has been buried nearly four years and he believes an examination would avail little.

LANGFITT SUBMITS REPORT.

Portland, Oct. 14.—Major Langfitt, United States engineer, has forwarded to Washington a report on the proposed canal and locks around the falls of the Columbia river at Celilo. The report is not made public, but it is understood that the estimated cost of the project will not greatly exceed that of the Harts plan which was rejected by the Washington board.

KILLED BY A GAMECOCK.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Oct. 14.—A little game cock has caused the death of John Gruener of this city. The rooster had been fitted with a steel spur for fighting. While teasing the bird two weeks ago Gruener thrust his foot toward it. In a vigorous defense the spur was driven through Gruener's shoe. He paid no attention to the wound. Lock-jaw developed and he died.

New York, Oct. 14.—Mourning as a suicide, Mrs. Lucy Mendola, who disappeared 10 years ago from a Corona, L. I., sanitarium, has been found wandering through the streets of Brooklyn. She did not know her name and was almost helpless. Her husband is in jail for shooting Dr. Coombs, proprietor of the sanitarium for permitting the woman to leave the place because her commitment papers were defective.

FAMILY FETE FOR KRUGER.

New York, Oct. 14.—Ex-President Kruger has celebrated his 78th birthday with a small family fete, the first since the war, says a Paris dispatch to the Times.

Ex-President Steyn and his family are living in a modest villa near Cannes. He suffers from paralysis of the limbs and is condemned to absolute rest.

PIERCE COMING HOME.

New York, Oct. 14.—Herbert H. D. Pierce, third assistant secretary of State, at Washington, who has been visiting a large number of United States Consulates in Europe to see what steps would be necessary for the proposed improvement of the service is about to sail for home, says a Herald dispatch from London. He has visited 30 of the principal consulates in Holland, Belgium, Germany and France.

CLEVELAND IN CHICAGO.

Chicago, Oct. 14.—Former President Cleveland was the principal speaker tonight at the annual banquet of the Commercial Club in the Auditorium hotel. The subject discussed by Mr. Cleveland was: "American Good Citizenship." This is the first time in eight years that Cleveland has visited Chicago, and he received an enthusiastic greeting.

SUBSTITUTE FOR WOODEN TIES.

Kansas City, Oct. 14.—Before the National Convention of Road Masters and Maintenance of Way Association here today, W. M. Camp of Chicago spoke of the necessity for finding a substitute for common wooden railway ties. At the present rate of consumption and destruction of timber by fire, he said, it is estimated that the supply will be practically exhausted in 30 or 40 years.
