CHARGES AGAINST MOTHER

Father Seeks to Have Children Taken From Her.

County Judge Trenchard yesterday ssued an order requiring the appearance in the county court, on October 22. of Christopher C. Grimes, his wife, Sarah A. Grimes, and their children Cyntha, aged 14, and Bessie, aged 12. The citation was the result of a petition filed in the court by Mr. Grimes who states that he and his wife are living apart; "that the mother of the children, Sarah A. Grimes, is a woman of notoriously bad character, and has grossly abused her parental authority over the children, and is totally unfit to have their care and custody."

The petition embodies the request that the girls be surrendered to the custedy of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society of Portland, which request will be complied with unless the mother is able to show cause why the court should permit the children to remain in her care. The case will be heard at 10 o'clock Thursday morning.
