British Tariff

Will Injure Us

Chamberlain's Investigator Says
New Plan Will Be Detri-
mental to America.

Chicago, Oct. 21.—The Tribune today

says: As representatives of Joseph Cham-
berlain, for whom he is investigating
the results of the protective tariff in
the United States, Ernest A. Hamlyn
of the Honorable Artillery Company of
London, reached Chicago last night.
The results of Mr. Hamlyn's investi-
gations thus far are embodied in a
preliminary report which he forwarded
to London from Chicago.

In it he declares the commercial
greatness of this country is due to the
tariff, adding that it would be the "sal-
vation of England." Mr. Hamlyn
summarized his report to Mr. Cham-
berlain as follows:

"Your protective tariff policy will
be the salvation of England. The
manufacturers and tradesmen I have
been during six thousand miles of
travel, while visiting the trade centers
in this country, frankly admit that the
English tariff will be a detriment to
the continued industrial prosperity of
America. They admit that it will be
best for England."

The report concludes with an offer by
Mr. Hamlyn to contribute \$500 to a
fund with which to bring to America
100 English workmen from 50 manufac-
turing cities to study the effects of
a tariff on the wages and living ex-
penses of the working class.

WILL APPEAL TO CONGRESS.

New York, Oct. 21.—At a meeting here
of the Association of Manufacturers
and Distributors of Food Products,
of the United States, composed of 36
manufacturers, it has been decided to
urge upon congress the enactment of
pure food legislation and to work for
a bill providing free interstate com-
merce in food products which conform
to ascertain standing of purity.
