### POOR ARE MADE THANKFUL

Captain Holten of the Salvation Army Brightens Homes.

Enough donations were delivered Captain Holten, of the Salvation Army, by the city schools, to provide 26 deserving persons with good Thanksgiving dinners. There was no public spread given, Captain Holten deeming it more practicable to deliver the gifts to the families in baskets, and this he did. There were many touching scenes enacted at the homes when the officer called with the good things, some of the women shedding tears of thankfulness.

"There is a mistaken idea," said Captain Holten yesterday, "that there are not poor people in Astoria deserving of assistance. As a matter of fact, there are many such, and it requires only a little inquiry to find them. Yesterday I could have disposed of a great deal more food than I had with perfect ease. I am already laying plans for Christmas giving and expect to furnish 100 families with dinners, families that otherwise would be without anything extra. Only today I was notified of a family in the eastern part of the city that is in real need, and will doubtless have my attention called to many cases of a like nature between now and the holidays."

When asked if effective work could be accomplished by the different Christian societies in the city working together, Captain Holten stated that such a scheme would, in his estimation, work to good advantage, and added that he would gladly lend what aid he had at his command to such a movement.

## Can Not Avoid Special Election

Governor's Writ Has Been Issued and Sheriff Could Not Possibly Ignore Mandate.

Of late there has been considerable talk in Astoria with reference to the suggestion advanced that Clatsop county ought to be saved the expense of the special election called by Governor Chamberlain. The election will cost the county \$1700 or \$1800, and it is contended, a state senator will be of little benefit, if indeed of any, to the people of the county at the special gathering of the legislators. All sorts of wild and visionary schemes have been suggested by persons anxious to avoid this expense, and only yesterday it was publicly recommended that the county might be saved a material sum if the two political parties were to agree upon a candidate, instead of each nominating one.

As to the proposal advanced that no special election be held, the idea is absurd. The duties of the governor and of the sheriffs in cases of the kind recently arising here are specifically and plainly defined in the Oregon code which says:

"When any vacancy shall happen in the office of member of the senate or house of representatives, by death, resignation, or otherwise, and a session of the legislature is to take place before the next biennial election, the governor shall issue a writ of election, directed to the sheriff of the county, or sheriffs of the counties composing the district in which such vacancy shall occur, commanding him or them to notify the several judges of election in his county or their district to hold a special election to fill such vacancy or vacancies, at a time appointed by the governor."

It will be observed that the code plainly instructs the various officials as to their procedure in case of vacancy in legislative offices. The law does not prescribe that the governor "may" issue a writ for a special election, but that he "shall" issue such writ. It would be just as utterly impossible for the sheriff to disobey the mandate of the governor as for the sheriff to disregard the mandate of the circuit court. The governor is instructed as to what he shall do and there is no other course open to him, except that he should undertake to disregard the laws of the state.

The question is an interesting one and brings up interesting possibilities. Suppose, for instance, that the two political parties should agree with the county officials that no election be held on December 16, as provided in the governor's writ, the understanding being that the writ be ignored. An agreement of this kind would make it possible for the judges and clerks of some remote precinct to get together, hold an election at which not more than half a dozen votes (or, for that matter, a single vote) might be cast and thus bring about the regular election of a state senator.

The governor might have ignored the code, but, having issued his writ, the election must be held.

As to the statement that the selection of a candidate by the two parties would save the county a material sum, this, too, is ridiculous. If there were to be but one candidate at the forthcoming election, the cost of the election would be as great as if there were four or five candidates.

### MRS. S. B. SMITH IS DEAD

Widow of Late Pioneer Breathes Her Last Thursday.

Mrs. S. B. Smith died Thursday afternoon at the old family home at Skipanon. Consumption was the immediate cause of death, a disease from which Mrs. Smith had long been a sufferer. She was the widow of the late Sibus B. Smith, a well known attorney and educator of this county, and who died some months ago of the same malady that ended the life of his wife.

Mrs. Smith was Miss May Swain, and was a native of New Hampshire, being married to Mr. Smith at Laconia, of that state, the town of her birth. She was married in 1870 and five years later moved to Oregon with her husband, settling at Skipanon on the west side. The Smiths since then have lived continuously in this county. Mrs. Smith is the mother of Mrs. May Wallingford, Mrs. C. Joyce, Tudor G. and Starr T. Smith, of Skipanon and Warrenton, and of Mrs. Agnes Day, of Seaside. Two sisters, Miss Etta Swain and Mrs. J. S. Rich, reside in the east. Rev. J. W. McCormac will conduct the funeral services which will be held tomorrow from the church on Clatsop plains. The interment will be in the old pioneer cemetery.
