 One City Treasurer, for a term of two
 years.
 One Police Commissioner, for a term
 of six years.
 One Auditor and Police Judge, for a
 term of two years.
 One City Surveyor, for a term of two
 years.
 One Superintendent of Streets, for a
 term of two years.
 Two Councilmen from the First ward,
 for a term of three years.
 One Councilman from the Third ward,
 for a term of three years.
 That the polls for said election shall
 be opened at the hour of 9 o'clock, a.

TO WIDEN ITS SCOPE
**Prof. Clark Speaks of the Proposed
 Levy for High School
 Purposes.**

COUNTRY PUPILS PAY TUITION
**Sound Argument in Favor of
 Equal Privileges to Pupils
 From Both City and
 Country.**

CITY Superintendent of Schools Clark
 believes that the proposed tax levy to
 be made upon the county for the sup-
 port of the local high school is the best
 thing possible. "There are eight pup-
 ils paying tuition at the present time,"
 said Mr. Clark yesterday. "Each pays
 \$20 for the year. It would require but
 a small levy to make up this and a
 good deal more. That the young people
 throughout the county should be priv-
 ilege to attend the high school with-
 out cost to themselves is certainly evi-
 dent to all, and tax levy if made would
 be so small and so justified that there
 would not likely be any objection to
 the plan." It is believed by Superin-
 tendent Clark and others that if the
 school would be thrown open to all free
 of charge that the increase of attend-
 ance would be marked, and the im-
 portance of the institution would
 quickly be manifest. The matter will
 be taken up with the county authori-
 ties at an early date, and it is thought
 will terminate favorably.
