

No Sign Of Italian Bark

Stranded Cavour Breaks Up and Precinct No. 1 117 Drifts Away---Captain Waiting Instructions.

Not a vestige of the Italian bark Cavour remains on the spit where it was stranded. Twenty-four hours after it struck, the vessel, together with the cargo, had washed away, so it is doubtful if any one who visits the scene of the wreck today will be able to carry away even a souvenir of the disaster.
