Harriman that the service of the Portland & Asiatic Steamship Company would be increased to meet the demands which an enlargement would require to provide necessary shipping facilities.

DUES TOO HEAVY

Pawtucket, R. I., Dec. 11.—A charter for a new organization, which will work along the same lines as, but in opposition to, the Ancient Order of United Workmen, has been granted by Secretary of State Bennett.

The Bureau of Navigation reports 90 vessels of 43,711 gross tons were built in the United States and officially numbered during November. Of these, 46 of 9891 tons were sail and 44 of 33,320 tons were steam.

A NOTABLE ARRIVAL

New York, Dec. 11.—W. H. Spottiswoode, king's printer, arrived with his wife on the steamship Arabic from Liverpool. Mr. Spottiswoode comes here to attend to some business matters.

AN UNLUCKY HOTEL MAN

New York, Dec. 11.—When Arthur P. Fegert, proprietor of a cafe at 115th street and Lenox avenue, entered the place he found that robbers had pried open the till, and taken \$30 in cash. This is the second misfortune Mr. Fegert has suffered within a week.

GETS STAY OF PROCEEDINGS

Philadelphia, Dec. 11.—Magistrate C. Harry Fletcher gave \$1500 bail today for his appearance on the charge of misconduct in office. A few days ago Judge Sulzberger allowed a bill of information against the magistrate, but the latter's counsel obtained a stay of proceedings from the supreme court.

Miss Bertha Holston is in the city, the guest of her brother, Captain F. Holston and his wife. Miss Holston will remain until after Christmas.

E. Van Dusen went to Portland this morning to attend the regular monthly meeting of the board of directors of the Lewis and Clark fair corporation. He will return either tonight or tomorrow.

To Be The City of Snake River

Clarkston Growing Rapidly and State Representative Predicts Great Future.

Seattle, Dec. 11.—State Representative George W. R. Peaslee, of Austin county, is convinced that Clarkston, his home town, is to become the metropolis of the Snake river valley. The town lies across the river from Lewiston, and Mr. Peaslee believes it is soon to supersede the Idaho town as the railroad center for Clearwater operations.

"There is no question but that the O. R. & N. is coming up the Snake from Riparian to Lewiston. In time the O. R. & N. must build from Huntington to Lewiston in order to get the grades that must be had to solve the transportation problem. That road has a right of way that extends on the Washington side of the Snake seven miles above Clarkston.

"Lewiston, a town of which I am rather proud, is located at a disadvantage for railroad development. The land the Northern Pacific now occupies for terminals and switch yards has been under water during floods, and moreover there is not enough available land to give the railroad the yard room that is required. Across the river at Clarkston the land lies high enough to save it from flood damage, and more over it is perfectly level.

"I am convinced that railroads in the Snake river and Clearwater countries will make Clarkston rather than Lewiston their headquarters.

"Two years ago Clarkston was a sage brush prairie. Today it has a population of 2,500 and is growing rapidly. With another railroad and the Northern Pacific entering Clarkston we are certain to have a big city in time."

LOST HIS DIAMONDS.

New York, Dec. 11.—On the charge of taking jewelry valued at about \$1,000 from Stanley Francis, a publisher living at the Hotel Royalton, a young woman named Nellie Olliver was arraigned in Jefferson Market and held in \$1,000 bail for trial. Francis said he met the woman Thursday night and had ridden in a handsome cab with her. The jewelry was returned.

AN OLD MAN'S DARLING

Boston, Dec. 11.—Winchester society was greatly surprised at learning today that Arthur E. Whitney, one of the wealthiest residents of that town and head of the Whitney Machine Co., had been married on Wednesday night to Miss Alice Marston, an Arlington girl, who up to the day of the wedding had been stenographer in the company's office. Mr. Whitney is 56 years old. He has a son who is 24, the same age as the bride.

New York, Dec. 11.—When Mrs. Cornelia Myers, the wife of Patrolman Michael Myers, of the East 104th street station, recognized Thomas Horton, colored, as a burglar who had entered her apartment, picking him out of a line of men in the Harlem police court, Horton fell fainting on the floor. When he revived he begged not to be taken before Mrs. Myers, who, it was learned, had fired three shots at him when she found him in her apartments. He was held for trial.
