The Diamonds of India. What has become of the diamonds of India? The "Regent" diamond, one of the French national jewels, came from a Kistna mine. The last fine diamond found, or acknowledged as found, in India was one of 57% carats, dug up at Bellars. Now no stones of any value are ever recorded as found.

Coldest and Hottest Places.

The coldest place on earth inhabited by man is Verkhoyansk, above the artic circle, in northeastern Siberia. The thermometer there drops to 90,degrees below zero in January, but sometimes it rises to 86 degrees above zero in the shade in July, dropping, however, to the freezing point on the warmest summer nights. The hottest place in the world is the interior of the great Sahara desert, in Africa, where the termometer rises to 122 degrees. The wettest place is Greytown, Nicaragua, where the mean annual rainfall is 260 inches. The place of least rain is Fort Nolloth, in South Africa, where less than an inch sometimes falls in a year .- Pittsburg Press
