NAVAL MEN ENTERTAINED

Brilliant Receptions Given on Board Vessels of Squadron and in City of Honolulu.

ATHELETIC SPORTS ON SHORE

Admiral Evans and Brother Officers Feted by Grateful Citizens of Islands and Possessions, Who Return Courtesy.

Honolulu, Dec. 28.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Via San Francisco, Jan. 5.—The officers of the American naval squadron have been the guests at a series of elaborate entertainments during their stay in Honolulu and the men have engaged in many kinds of athletic contests with teams and champions on shore.

On the evening of the 26th Admiral Evans and the other officers of the squadron gave a reception on board the battleships Kentucky and Wisconsin to the citizens of Honolulu, which is generally described as the most brilliant affair of the kind ever seen here. The big battleships were lined with incandescent lights up to the tips of their topmasts, along all their spars and along the sides and decks, and the wharf between them was also elaborately illuminated. Admirals Evans and Cooper and staffs received the guests. The shore contents included a number of contests in which the sailors either beat or fought draws with the Honolulu champions. Bill Huihui, the Hawaiian champion, fought 10 rounds to a draw with James Sherlock of the Wisconsin. The Kamehameha baseball team of Honolulu, composed largely of Hawaiians defeated the Wisconsin team by nine to seven. A football team between the Oregon and Kentucky teams resulted in their third draw without a score. On Saturday there was a regatta in the harbor.

W. D. Alexander, territorial surveyor and representative of the United States geodetic survey has returned from a trip to properly locate the Island of Nihoa, near Kauai. The island is misplaced on all mariner's charts. Alexander with two assistants made a correct triangulation and placed the island correctly on his charts.

New York, Jan. 5.—Acting on a report made by Assistant Foreman Linehan, who has been investigating New York theaters, Fire Commissioner Hayes has assigned 13 additional firemen to duty at as many theaters here. He declares more men would have been stationed in the playhouses but for the law which limits them to two men under normal conditions.

HAY'S RESOLUTION REFERRED
Message of President Accorded Applause of Republican Side.

Washington, Jan. 5.—The privileged resolution proposed by Hay of Virginia, providing for the investigation of certain statements in the Bristow post-office report reflecting on the membership of the house, was today referred to the committee on postoffices and postroads, on the motion of Payne, of New York, majority leader. Eight republicans voted with the minority on Hay's motion to order the previous question which was lost and three republicans voted with the democratic minority against the motion to refer.

The president's message relative to Panama and the canal was read in the house, receiving applause on the republican side.

ALLEGED VICTIM SUMMONED.

Mrs. Ames to Appear in Court to Prosecute Thomas Davis.

San Francisco, Jan. 5.—An attachment was issued by the United States attorney today for Mrs. A. H. Ames of Marshfield, Oregon, the woman who claims she was brutally assaulted while on the steamer Alliance some few months ago. She will be brought to this city to appear against Thomas Davis to prosecute him for the heinous crime which is alleged he committed.

NEW YORK IS THE CHOICE

Intercollegiate Fencing Association Meets and Arrange for Annual Tournament.

SAME LINES AS LAST YEAR

Leading Colleges of Country Represented—Invitation Extended by St. Louis Fair to Compete in Olympic Contests.

New York, Jan. 5.—Delegates from the seven universities composing the Intercollegiate Fencing Association, at their second annual meeting, have decided to hold the annual team and individual championship tournament in this city at the New York Athletic Club, April 1 and 2. The competition will be conducted on the same lines as last year, each man fencing all the representatives of the competing colleges except his own.

Teams will consist of three men and the one scoring the largest number of victories wins the championship while the individual scoring the greatest number of wins receives the medal for the individual championship. The delegates present were from the University of Pennsylvania, Cornell, Columbia, Yale, Harvard, West Point and Annapolis.

An invitation to the association to send teams for competition in the world's fair games at St. Louis next fall during the special fencing tournament arranged by the Olympic games committee was referred to a special committee.
