## REGISTER-- DO IT NOW

Books Have Been Opened at the Court House for Coming June Election.

### LIST OF JUDGES AND CLERKS

County Court Apportions the Election Officials for All the Precincts of the County, the Majority Being Democrats.

The county registration books are now open at the office of County Clerk Clinton. Under the law registrations begin January 1, but in Clatsop the books were not promptly delivered and the start was not made until yesterday. The books will remain open until May 15, and all persons desiring to vote at the June elections must observe the formality of registering. In view of the fact that there is always a rush at the last, voters are urged to go to the clerk's office at the court house at the earliest convenience. It is necessary that a voter shall tell the clerk his name, age, occupation, residence and if a naturalized citizen who has not registered previously for a county election, he must show his naturalization papers. The laws regulating the registration of foreign born voters is very strict, and the clerk will decline to register any person who can not answer fully all the questions propounded to him.

Yesterday the county court compiled the list of judges and clerks of election for the several precincts of the county. As the county court is at present made up of two democrats and one republican, the rule followed in the selection of judges and clerks given the democrats the majority. The list is as follows:
