"Daughters of the Faith", of New York, Announce Intention to Root Out Evil-Doers.

DIVORCEES ARE UNDER BAN

Agencies for Moral Evil in Society Will Be Cut by Organization Formed for Good Work.

New York, Jan. 14.—Social ostracism for divorce and wearers of decollete gowns, gamblers, including players of bridge, whist and users of liquor is the object of a society which has been organized under the name "Daughters of the faith." Its purpose is declared to be "discountance these usages and customs that are the evident causes of the spread of moral evil in society."

Catholic Hierarchy Abandons Demand

London, Jan. 14.—It is understood that a settlement of the Irish university question is imminent. The Catholic hierarchy has abandoned its demand for ecclesiastical control and has consented to accept the scheme proposed by Lord Dunraven, namely the affiliation of the two new Catholic colleges with the Dublin university. COLORADO MINERAL RADIUM CURE FOR DEADLY DISEASES

Sientist Describes Result of Experiment That Shows Curative Properties.

Interior of Body is Flooded With Sunlight, That Quickly Expels All Maladies That Have Long Baffled the Most Artistic Surgical Skill.

New York, Jan. 14.—Radium from minerals found in Colorado has been exhibited here at a meeting of the Technology Club, before which the latest developments in the treatment of diseases by the use of liquids charged with radio-activity was described by Dr. William J. Morton, of the New York Post-Graduate hospital, who said that he had effected three complete cures of cancer with radium. Remarkable results were also said to have been achieved in cases of malaria and other diseases due to bacteria.

"I have experimented for six months," said Dr. Morton, "with solutions which become radio-active when exposed to radium for 24 hours. To give these solutions in very large doses would probably kill a human being, and great care must be exercised in these experiments. Sunlight is a great curative agency and liquids charged with violent rays have practically the same effect.

"A later method is to employ solutions like quinine sulphate that have the property of fluorescence. A patient may be given this solution, and then radium is held near the body, or the X-ray used the liquid becomes luminous and sunlight may be said to flood the interior of the body.

"In chronic malaria, cancer of the liver and many other ailments, this treatment has already shown good results. Up to the present time I have treated cancer with radium by suspending the latter at a certain distance from the mouth of a goblet-shaped glass and applying the mouth over the affected part, and holding it there."

IMMEDIATE DANGER OF WAR BELIEVED TO BE AVERTED

New York, Jan. 14.—An important personage, a privy councillor, gives the assurance, cables the Herald St. Petersburg correspondent, that the news received from the far east is of such favorable nature that an immediate danger of war is averted.

This means that the anticipation of the Russian foreign office that the reply given would enable Japan to continue negotiations has been realized. The future will depend upon Japan's demands because only parts of the Russian reply are acceptable. Meanwhile the foreign office will issue a statement to the powers drawing attention to her inability to give the promised freedom of trade in Manchuria until the country has been brought into proper condition, safety and order.

Optimism reigns and general congratulations are the order of the day.

HUMAN HAND CUT OFF TO OBTAIN THE RINGS

Chicago, Jan. 14.—A human hand and some money and jewelry have been found in the debris of the Iroquois theater. The hand was that of a man and apparently had been severed from the wrist in an attempt to get possession of rings. As nobody was found from whom a hand had been taken, the supposition is that the body may have been consumed in the fire.

The police found \$30 in bills encased in a chamois skin bag, and also a five karat opal among the fragments of broken glass and charred wood.

M. Pelletan Makes Statement.

Paris, Jan. 14.—M. Pelletan, minister of marine, in an interview concerning the statements published in Figaro that the cruiser Sully which had been ordered to far eastern waters was unfit for a voyage owing to certain imperfections and lack of equipment, declares that the cruiser will not start for the far east until she is absolutely ready. M. Pelletan denied the report that France will supply Russia with three submarine boats.

Jiminez Meets With Success.

New York, Jan. 14.—According to advices by steamer from Montecristi the Jiminez party at Santo Domingo is meeting with great success, says a Herald dispatch from St. Thomas, D. W. I. While the capital is holding out against the forces it is believ-

ed, the dispatch adds, that the provisional government will soon capitulate.

Staff of Umpires Named.

Chicago, Jan. 14.—President Ban Johnson makes the announcement that the American league's staff of umpire for the season of 1904 will be Jack Sheridan "Silk" O'Loughlin, Tom Connolly, W. B. Carpenter and probably Frank Lwyer. O'Loughlin and Carpenter have already signed 1904 contracts.
