

IMPORTANT CHANGES TAKE PLACE IN THE ARMY

Retirement of General Young and Pro- motion of General Chaysee Causes a General Shaking Up.

Washington, Jan. 20.—Many important changes will occur in the army during the next few days, resulting from the retirement of Lieutenant-General Young and the promotion of General Chaysee to be lieutenant-general. Generals Kobbe and General Mordecai were retired today and Generals Sanger, Bates, Haskell, Hathaway and Cox, will follow them Friday. General Dodge will become paymaster general Saturday.

General Randolph will retire and General Gillespie becomes permanent major-general and assistant chief of the general staff, while General MacKenzie will become one of the chief engineers.

General Storey will succeed General Randolph as chief of artillery. Colonels Taylor, Butler, Kline, Dougherty, Allen, True and the deputy quartermaster general will be made brigadier-generals and be retired at once.

HEAD OF LADIES' G. A. R. TOURING THE NORTHWEST

Portland, Jan. 20.—Touring the Pacific northwest and officially inspecting the various lodges of the Ladies' Grand Army of the Republic, Mrs. Belinda S. Bailey, whose home is in San Francisco, is today in Portland. Mrs. Bailey is national president of the order, and is accompanied by Mrs. Lizzie M. Benedict, of this city, the two having recently paid visits to Salem, Albany and Roseburg lodges.

Clever, prepossessing in appearance and a brilliant conversationalist, Mrs. Bailey this morning discussed at length the objects of the Ladies' G. A. R. She is today a guest at the Hotel Portland. Before returning home she expects to go to Indianapolis to attend the Woman's Council, which meets February 2. She also will attend the G. A. R. encampment in Maine. Mrs. Bailey is very enthusiastic concerning the cordial receptions that have been tendered her throughout Oregon. After her Oregon tour she will visit throughout Washington.

HANDCUFFED PRISONER LEAPS FROM RAPIDLY MOVING TRAIN

Los Angeles, Jan. 20.—Edward Parker, a professional crook under sentence at the Folsom penitentiary for grand larceny, leaped from a northbound Southern Pacific train in the Tehachapi mountains early this morning, and despite the fact that he was handcuffed made his escape.

Parker was being taken to the penitentiary by Deputy Sheriff Cleveland, and the officer permitted him to go to the lavatory. He remained for some time, and Cleveland went to the end of the car just as Parker was climbing out of a window. The officer opened fire on him at close range but it is not known whether he struck him. Cleveland also jumped from off the train, but Parker jumped down an embankment and escaped in the darkness through a deep canyon.

Sheriff White left today for the Tehachapi pass to assist in the search for the fugitive. A reward of \$50 has been offered for his apprehension.

BODY OF "CITIZEN" TRAIN TO BE VIEWED BY CHILDREN

New York, Jan. 20.—The body of George Francis Train, who died early yesterday, has been removed from Mills Hotel to a mortuary chapel, where it will lie in state until the funeral hour tomorrow. Thousands of children in whom Mr. Train displayed remarkable interest are expected to take a farewell view of the remains. The funeral will be private and the interment will be made in Greenwood cemetery.

Of his once considerable fortune, Mr. Train retained nothing personally except the interest he had in 3000 lots he once owned in Omaha. Protracted litigation has taken place about them and will, it is said, be continued by his daughter.

FIREMAN RETURNING HOME APPALLED BY A TRAGEDY

New York, Jan. 20.—An unexplained tragedy has been discovered in the home at Oakland, N. J., of Arthur Oswald, a fireman. When he returned from his work in another village, Oswald was horrified the find the body of his eight year old son lying upon the kitchen floor. The child had been be-

headed and his head lay between his feet. The boy's pet dog also had been killed in a similar manner.

Mrs. Oswald lay in bed in a delirium with her seven months old baby sleeping peacefully at her side. Two other children lay asleep in their crib. Thus far nothing has been learned from the mother as to the tragedy.
