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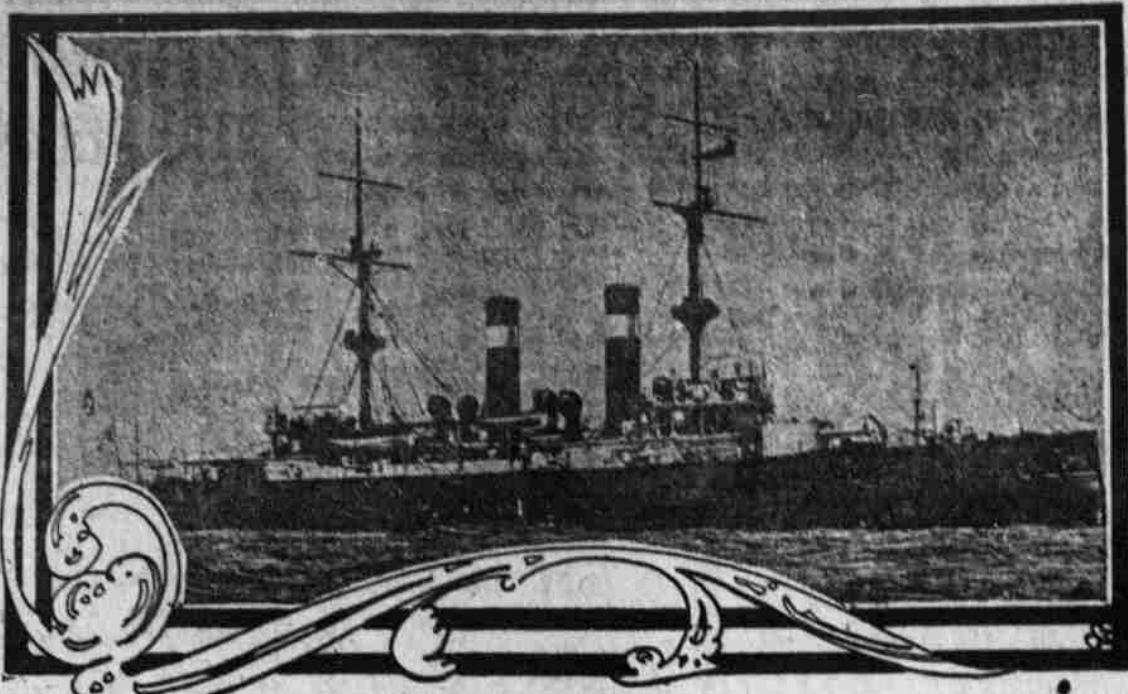

COMPLETE SKELETON OF MASTADON FOUND INTACT

The following is from the Dawson Sun, just received at this office:

Fred Levy, of the hillside on 5 below Amack's discovery on Quartz creek, reached the city yesterday with a report of a wonderful discovery on the creek claim abate of him of a complete mastodon. The creek claim which is furnishing the complete specimen is owned by Swanson, Pierson and Porter. A shaft 35 feet deep was required to reach bedrock, and specimen was struck.

The find was made a week ago, but until more of it was uncovered little was said of it. Now the careful work of uncovering the priceless specimen has progressed to a point where its dimensions can be taken. Said Mr. Levy:

"I went down the shaft to see the mastodon before I started for town. Heretofore all discoveries along this line have been of separated bones, skulls, teeth and tusks, but there is a complete specimen with the great tusks still attached to the great skull, and the skull attached to the vertebrae, and the other members of the body—so far as it is yet uncovered—yet attached to the vertebrae. "Much if not most of the skin is yet attached. But it is in so badly

decomposed condition that it is almost impossible to work in that part of the drift. Indeed, when the spot was first struck, the stench drove the men out, and a new drift had to be planned. The corpse of a few thousand years is only well preserved as to the bones. I examined the tusks and skull, and found them smooth and unchewed, with points well preserved, and with the first girder tusks are not the longest found, being but six feet from the tip to point of juncture with the skull. But the skull is immense, being 22 inches across. The tusks being in place give the monster a huge appearance hard to realize without seeing for oneself. The work of excavation goes on slowly. Steam is being used, but owing to the stench I have spoken of, after a thawing it is some time before the men will face the terrible odor and remove the thawed earth.

"So far as I am aware it is the second complete specimen to have been discovered in the world. The other one was found in the ice of Siberia, and an expedition of scientists went after it at an expense of 10,000 pounds. There is much good ground on Quartz creek, but it may prove that the ground occupied by this complete mastodon is the most valuable for its area of anything yet found."

Denver, March 22.—Orders were issued by Governor Peabody today for the entire national guard of this state, numbering 2000 men, to be prepared for service at three hours' notice. No information was given out as to what service will be required, but it is unofficially announced that 300 men will be sent to the southern coal fields to protect negroes who have been hired to take the places of striking coal miners.

BOND IS RAISED.

Case of Land Fraud Begins in San Francisco Court.

San Francisco, March 22.—The preliminary examination of F. A. Hyde and Henry P. Dimond, charged in an indictment of the federal grand jury, of Washington, D. C., with obtaining government land by fraudulent means, began today.

On the motion of the government's attorney, the bond of Hyde was raised to \$30,000 and that of Dimond to \$15,000. Both furnished the required bond and the case was continued until tomorrow.

Miners Welcome Delegates.

New York, March 22.—A message from Iouque states that a warm welcome has been given to two democrat-

ic deputies who have gone there on their own account to quietly investigate the conditions of labor in the nitrate fields, cables the Herald's correspondent at Valparaiso, Chile.

This welcome stands in marked contrast to the reception given to Errazuriz Urmineta, minister of the Interior, who as a millionaire, was regarded by the workers as ignorant of the inner life of the poorer classes and as being prejudiced.
