

# ODD CRAFT IN HARBOR

### Five Masted Schooner H. K. Hall Pays First Visit to This Port.

### FROM HONOLULU IN BALLAST

### Vessel Is Finely Rigged and Attracts Much Attention—Other Marine News of Interest.

An odd-looking craft, the five-masted schooner H. K. Hall, arrived in the river Sunday. The Hall is one of the two five-masted schooners on the coast, and is now here on her first visit. She comes in ballast and is under charter to the Pacific Export Lumber Company to load lumber for Manila. She is the finest schooner-rigged vessel that ever made this port, and, having the distinction of being one of very few of the five-masters, attracted more or less attention.

The three-masted schooner Lunsman, which arrived Saturday from Honolulu, beat the Hall on the trip up from the islands. The Lunsman departed from Honolulu March 13 and reached Astoria in 19 days. The Hall left March 10 and got in after a run of 23 days. The master of the Lunsman reports that he experienced some very bad weather a few days ago, when a couple of hundred miles south of the Columbia. The storm prevailed at sea and there was no evidence of it on land.

The Hall sailed from Puget sound last August with a cargo of lumber for Australia. She loaded coal at Newcastle for Honolulu and then sailed in ballast for Astoria. She is a newly equipped vessel, registering 1,105 net tons and 1,237 gross tons. The five-masted schooner Louis is the only other vessel of this class which has ever made Astoria. The wife of the master of the Hall accompanies him.

### THE STRIKE IS STILL ON.

### Central Labor Council Will Take Up Longshoremen's Difficulties.

The strike of the longshoremen's union against the Columbia River Packers' Association and Samuel Elmore is still on. The work of loading the bark Harry Morse was continued yesterday and all of the coal has been placed in the vessel's hold. The union sailors are engaged in the work.

The ship Berlin, which is loading for Alaska, arrived down the river Sunday and took a berth at the railroad dock. She is under charter to the Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company. When she arrived the officials of the longshoremen's union notified the Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company officials that they would expect to furnish the men to load the vessel. They were told the work was being carried on by the union sailors, but that union longshoremen would be employed if additional help were required. Whether or not this stand on the part of the company will be the signal for a strike against it did not develop yesterday afternoon. Because of the fact that Mr. Elmore's steamers were placed under the ban by the longshoremen's union on account of Mr. Elmore's connection with the Columbia River Packers' Association, it would follow

as a matter of course that the Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company would also be declared unfair by the union, as Mr. Elmore is a stockholder in that corporation.

The longshoremen's union has five delegates to the Central Labor Council and at the next meeting of that body it is likely the issues involved in the strike will be brought up for discussion. Union men not members of the longshoremen's organization say the stand taken by the longshoremen will not be approved.

### Hesper's Terrible Experience.

The American bark Hesper, which sailed from San Francisco for Astoria last Friday, was a few years ago the scene of one of the most fearful sea tragedies that has ever been recorded. Her crew mutinied down in the South Pacific and murdered the captain and two mates, and being unable to properly navigate the ship, put into the first port they came to and told such a fishy tale that they were promptly arrested and brought to San Francisco for trial. The ringleader of the mutineers, a man named St. Clair, enlisted some influential support in his behalf, and the trials of the accused men extended over a period of several years. St. Clair was finally executed. The affair occurred about a dozen years ago, the details are not recalled at this time, but on account of the shocking brutality of the murderers, it attracted widespread attention when the news first reached San Francisco. The Hesper was built at Port Blakely about 20 years ago and has been in the off-shore trade for the greater part of her career. She will load at the Hume mill.

### Earns Big Demurrage.

It is seldom that a vessel under charter can make more money lying in port than she can make while sailing the seas, but the Italian ship Cressington, which completed her cargo in Portland Saturday night, is the rare exception to this rule. The vessel had the usual demurrage clause in her charter, and demurrage clause in her charter, and has earned for her owners something over \$2,000, which is said to be the largest amount of demurrage ever paid to a lumber ship in the port. Since she began loading some of the good-sized schooners plying in the coasting trade have arrived in port, loaded, sailed and returned and loaded another cargo. The vessel goes to the west coast of South America, and will probably leave down today.

### Marine Notes.

The Invermay and H. K. Hall were towed up the river yesterday.

The Elder arrived from San Francisco late yesterday afternoon.

The schooner C. A. Klose is lying in the stream, and will probably depart today for San Francisco. She is laden with cordwood, having taken on 450 cords at Patterson's Landing.

The steamer Elmore arrived yesterday from Tillamook. She brought 93 cases of salmon, six tons of household goods and a quantity of butter, eggs, cheese and potatoes.

Two large cargoes were cleared yesterday. The schooner Zampa, departing for San Pedro, took 450,000 feet and the schooner Alice McDonald, the cargo of which is destined for the Southern California port, has on board 650,000 feet. The McDonald is still in the harbor.

The British bark Invermay arrived in port Sunday from Hamburg and Ostend, Germany, via San Diego. She brings 98.5 tons of pig iron, 1,778 barrels of cement and a quantity of liquors, linoleum, glass and other general freight. Part of the Invermay's cargo was unloaded at San Diego.

When used in the open field or battlements there is usually enough wind blowing to carry away the fumes, but when fired from turrets on board ship the gases are liable to be blown back into the compartment. In recent target practice by a battleship the wind blew the fumes into the turret and nearly asphyxiated the entire gun crew."
