Van Dine seemed to be more affected than Marx. He replied:

"I hope so."

Marx said: "I am ready," and went o the scaffold with the priests. Preparatory to the third execution the rope was tested with a bag of sand. It was feared the strands might have become weakened by the strain of the two previous hangings. The rope, however, was found to be satisfactory.

The specific offense for which Van Dine, Neidermeier and Marx were tried and sentenced was the murder of Frank Stewart, a clerk in the Chicago City railway carbarns, during a robbery there on the morning of August 30, 1903. James B. Johnson, a motorman, also was killed, and two persons were wounded. The handits escaped after having secured \$2240. Apprehension of the trio in Indiana was brought about through the boastfulness of Marx, which also caused his own undoing. While under the influence of liquor he displayed a magazine revolver of the kind known to derers. He asserted that the police would never take him alive.
