## LABOR UNION FINES MEMBER FOR ASSAULT

### First Instance of Kind in History of Chicago Just Recorded--Nonunionist Beaten by Associate.

Chicago, April 22.—For the first time in Chicago it is said an instance has been recorded where a labor union fined a member for assaulting a non-union worker. The case was that of David Bergquist, a member of the Carriage and Wagon Workers' union, charged with assaulting Harry Stevens, a non-union fellow employe at a factory. Bergquist was produced in court by the union, his union associates gave the only evidence against him and he was fined \$25 by the labor organization for the alleged assault.

ceded the execution of Marx and Van Dine. When the jailer entered Marx's room to give notice to prepare for the end, Marx said:

"I want to see Harvey."  
Van Dine was brought from his room a few steps away into Marx's room. When the two men faced each other, Marx said:

"Harvey, I hope to see you soon, and I think we will meet again."  
Van Dine seemed to be more affected than Marx. He replied:

"I hope so."  
Marx said: "I am ready," and went to the scaffold with the priests. Preparatory to the third execution the rope was tested with a bag of sand. It was feared the strands might have become weakened by the strain of the two previous hangings. The rope, however, was found to be satisfactory.

### STORY OF THEIR CRIME.

Followed Career of Robbery and Murder for Six Months.

Chicago, April 22.—Hanging of the youthful car barn bandits followed closely a period of crime of less than six months. In that time eight mur-

ders were committed, all attendant upon robberies or efforts to escape arrest.

The specific offense for which Van Dine, Neidermeier and Marx were tried and sentenced was the murder of Frank Stewart, a clerk in the Chicago City railway car barns, during a robbery there on the morning of August 30, 1903. James B. Johnson, a motor-man, also was killed, and two persons were wounded. The bandits escaped after having secured \$2240. Roeski was not concerned in this crime, but after the conviction of his companions was tried separately for one of the murders in which he was accused as the principal.

Apprehension of the trio in Indiana was brought about through the boastfulness of Marx, which also caused his own undoing. While under the influence of liquor he displayed a magazine revolver of the kind known to have been used by the car barn murderers. He asserted that the police would never take him alive.

On November 26, less than a week after the confession of Marx, word was received that three men answering the descriptions of the car barn bandits, were in hiding in a "dugout" near

Clark, Ind. Seven policemen were immediately sent to the town. Surrounding the abode, the officers prepared for a fight, while Shuehan approached and opened the door of the "dugout."

One of the bandits, who was immediately recognized as Roeski, appeared and was ordered to surrender. Instead he darted back into the cave. No sooner had he done so than firing began, and volley after volley aimed at the officers came from the magazine guns of the bandits.

Concealing themselves behind trees and bushes, as best they could, the police returned the fire. Suddenly two of the outlaws jumped from the cave and escaped across the frozen prairie, keeping up a fusillade as they ran.

Detective Driscoll advanced to the "dugout" and was firing at the fleeing desperadoes, when Neidermeier—the police thought there had been but two in the hollow—emerged, fatally shot him in the back and joined his companions, while the other policemen were still engaging the outlaws. A moment later Detective Zimmer fell seriously wounded. The police then decided to send to Chicago for reinforcements. A special train with 50 policemen, armed with rifles, was rushed to the scene and the hunt renewed.

Although escape was now impossible, the men showed no signs of submission. They had not halted since firing their last volley and arrived at Tolliston exhausted, but still determined to avoid capture.

On a sidetrack at Tolliston, where section men were working, stood an engine and a train of cars. Then followed the execution of a quickly-formed plan to seize the train and escape. The three outlaws jumped into the cab and commanded Fireman Coffee to pull out. Brakeman John Scovia attempted to take the revolver from Neidermeier, while the other two bandits pointed their revolvers at Coffee. The scuffle was short and Scovia pitched head foremost out of the cab with a bullet in his brain.

With their guns still pointed at Coffee's head, the three ordered him hastily to take the train out of the siding, and it started on a wild run to Liverpool. In the woods, a short distance away, were a number of armed farmers, who, having heard of the escape of the outlaws, had started to intercept them.

The posse reached Tolliston about noon, just as the train passed. They

rushed across the prairie to a point where the road curves, and where there was a locked switch, compelling Fireman Coffee to stop. Knowing they were surrounded and that further resistance would be useless, the criminals, a few minutes later, decided to surrender.

At yesterday's adjourned session of the county court Judge Trenchard was authorized to employ the men required to remove such portions of the present building as may be necessary to facilitate the construction of the new court house. The court hoped to have the plans for the new structure, but the illness of Architect Lazarus made this impossible. The architect's health is improving, however, and there is no doubt that the plans will be available by the time the regular May term of court is held. The court yesterday considered several petitions for reduced timber land assessments. Adjournment was taken for the term.
