JUST A JOKE MASTER SAYS

Captain of Schooner Samar States
That He Will Not Race With
Schooner Hall.

FOUR-MASTER GETS TO SEA

Master Thinks He Will Catch
Five Sticker, But Has Not
Wagered on It—Other Mar-
itime News.

The four-masted schooner Samar, with a cargo of lumber for Manila, departed Sunday. Her master was ashore Sunday morning and when questioned about his reported race across the ocean with the five-masted schooner H. K. Hall said he thought the report a joke. The captain went on to explain that he had made no wager with the master of the five-sticker, but that he remarked to the captain of the Hall that he expected to catch him if he got away from port before the Samar should leave.

"We never made any wager," said the captain. "Of course, I have lots of confidence in my ship, but there was no talk of a bet of any kind, and if the Hall's master thinks we are going to race he is mistaken. We will make just as good a trip as we can, of course, and I hope to reach Manila before Asmusen gets to sing-tau. But if I don't I'll not lose any sleep—nor any money."

The Hall has a few days' start of the Samar, and, as both vessels are crack sailers, shipping men will await with interest the outcome of the voyages, especially in view of the talk of their respective sailing qualities.

Gas Buoy in Trouble.

The new gas buoy recently placed at the mouth of the river has been taken to the buoy depot by the Manzanita. The buoy was in good condition when the tender picked it up, but the current was so strong it would not stay at its moorings and was adrift when found. The old buoy was constantly in trouble and frequently was extinguished at night, but the new one was so moored that it was in a very strong current. It is the intention to find a new location for it, where it will not be interfered with by the current.

Marine Notes.

The Aberdeen departed Sunday for California with a lumber cargo.

The Despatch arrived down the river yesterday with lumber and piling and departed for the Bay city.

The steam schooner Grace Dollar arrived yesterday from San Francisco. She is to load cordwood.

The oriental liner Nicomedia is due to arrive from the far east. She is coming on her maiden voyage to this port.

New Record of Registrations

Total in City and County Greater
Than Ever Before in History
of Clatsop County.

When County Clerk Clinton receives mail returns, it is expected, the registration of Clatsop county for the forthcoming elections will exceed 2000. The books were closed at 5 o'clock last night, but blanks may have been mailed from some of the country precincts that will not reach the office until today or tomorrow. It is thought probable that few blanks will thus be received, as the statement of the registration shows a pretty full vote has been registered outside the city, the total exceeding that of 1900 and 1902.

Yesterday 179 names were added to the rolls, and the clerks were kept very busy. Blanks came in from nearly all the county precincts, Olney making the banner showing of the day. Sven-

son, Clatsop, Melville, Clifton, Westport, Vesper and Mishawaka show material reduction as compared with the registration of two years ago, but all the other precincts in the county have either held their own or made material gains.

In the city every precinct gained over 1902. No. 3 precinct shows the greatest gain, 64, while No. 4 shows the smallest, 22. No. 4 leads, with 275. No. 3 and No. 5 holding second place, each having furnished 274 voters' names. The gain in the city over 1902 was 240. The statement of the registration issued at the close of business last night showed a total gain for the county of 273, and mail returns will probably increase the gain to 300 or more.

The total registration in the county this year is 2583, as compared with 2292 two years ago and 2565 four years ago. In 1900 the country registration was 927; the vote, 755; in 1902 the country registration was 908; the vote, 846. In 1900 the city registration was 1638; the vote, 1365; in 1902 the city registration was 1384; the vote, 1500. It is the opinion that this year's vote will exceed 1800.
