New York Stock Exchange Startled by New Ruling.

New York, May 20 .- A ruling by Judge Holt, of the United States district court, directing a member of the New York stock exchange to sell his seat for the benefit of creditors, has upset all precedents of the Exchange.

The ruling was made in the case of Edward Sanford Hatch of the firm of Hulburt, Hatch & Co., against whom a petition in bankruptcy was filed in August last. Their liabilities were clusive of Hatch's seat on the Exchange. The owner of the seat refused to apply it to the assets and the trustee in bankruptcy petitioned Hill.
