

The first few years after quitting college are usually a period of disillusionment and readjustment of the graduate's prespective. The relative values of things shift. He learns for the first time the magnitude of things that he had condemned and the insignificance of things that he had admired. This readjustment was predicted and described the other day by Pres. Wheeler in his address to the graduating class at Berkeley. "Some of you are quicker-witted than others," he said; "some are blessed with a superior memory; some excel in gifts of reasoning-power to hold the line of continuous thought; some are better looking than others; your monthly allowances from home are not all the same. According to many considerations such as these you have seemed during your college days to differ from each other, and according more or less consciously of classifying yourselves into grades. Ten years from now you will be thoroughly reclassified. Twenty-five years hence that classification will have systallized into permanent form and be practically unalterable. And many who are first
