#### **FIND POISON** IN CANDY

New York Officials Find Injurious Substances in the Sweets Sold to Children.

WILL BE STOPPED AT ONCE

Systematic Polsoning of Children by Adulterants Will Not Be Telerated Any Longer.

New York, June 14 .- Adulterants highly injurious to the health have been found in innocent looking casks, chean caramels and other sweet stuffs sold freely to children here, and a report has been made to the attorney general of the state by chemists working under direction of the state department of agriculture.

In one instance Il graine of parafine was found in four small chocolate covered cakes. The chemists declare that paraffine resists the action of strong acids and is highly injurious to the digestive organs.

Evidently it had been used by these bakers and candy manufacturers to keep their product from becoming stale. Other samples of candles disclosed aniline dyes and lead poisons. Injurious coloring matters was not confined to cheap candies but was found in some of the most expensive varieties that are made.


