Seven Thousand Electrical Constructors Are to Go Out Today in Eastern States.

New York, June 17 .- The executive International union at a meeting here

has ordered an international strike against the Otis Elevator Company. Notifications were sent to all the locals oncerns in the principal cities of the ast, central west and eastern Canada.

The strike is expected to go into effect today and tomorrow and will affect about 7000 men, including 900 in New York. It is in support of the local unions in Boston and Philadelphia, which have been on strike for seven weeks. The Philadelphia union demanded an increase in wages from No Cause \$3.60 to \$4.25 a day, which was refused.

Committees of the international union and the Otis and its subsidiary companies were in session for two days at the main office of the company here, but the conference falled.
