AFTER FIFTY-THREE YEARS.

Old-Time Resident of Oregon is Visiting in Portland.

Mrs. Margaret Magruder Wall of Alameda, Cal., is visiting in Portland. She came to Oregon in 1844 with her parents, located at Oregon City, and lived there until 1851, when the family moved to California. Her father, Theophilus Magruder, will be always remembered in Oregon history as a member of the Oregon Exchange Company, which coined the first gold on the Pacific coast at Oregon City in February, 1849. After removing to California, Mrs. Wall was married in 1855 to General Joseph G. Wall, who was one of the founders of Crescent City, Cal., and a prominent figure in the lumbering and shipping industries centering at that place. She has been absent from her home, which is in Alameda, Cal., for two months, making a tour of the east in company with her

son-in-law, Captain Richard Bradley, and his family. Although it has been 53 years since she left this region, she has a very vivid recollection of early scenes in Oregon City, and recalls the late Dr. Atkinson, Sidney W. Moss, Joseph L. Meek, the Barlows, Miss Lizzie T'Vault, now Mrs. Kenney, Miss Minnie Holmes, now Mrs. Daniel O'Neill; Captain George A. Pease and many others. Her husband, General Wall, was a great friend of the late Captain Flavel of Astoria, and was one of the ten survivors of the wreck of the steamer General Warren, which went to pieces on Clatsop Spit, on January 28, 1852.
