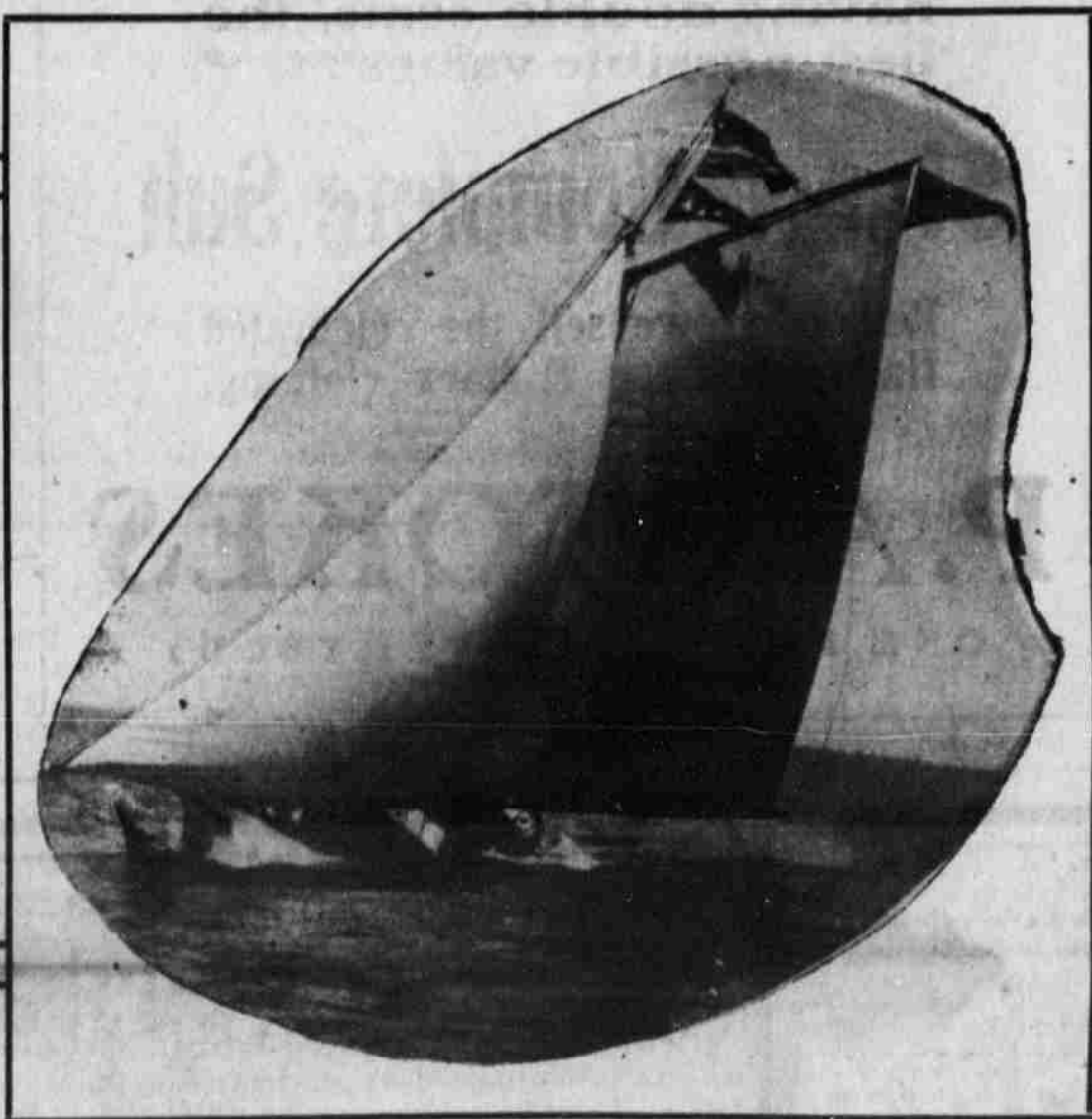

What Alaska May Yet Surpass.

From \$12,625,000 to \$15,573,000 worth of butter is now exported from Siberia, or more than twice the value of the wheat export in 1900, the last favorable harvest year. The Siberian cow yields little milk, but the quality is notable for richness. About 19 pounds of milk in winter and 23 in summer are sufficient to make a pound of butter, while in Denmark 28 pounds are needed.—Hartford Times.

Postoffices Show the Business.

Final returns show that 41 of the 57 presidential postoffices in Washington transacted a sufficient increase in business during the fiscal year just closed to accord greater compensation for postmasters, with but one showing a reduction, the net salary increase being \$4500. In this state 72 per cent of the postoffices were readjusted to a higher level, heading every commonwealth in the country.—West Coast Trade
